



### **I. SITUATION OVERVIEW**

#### **A. BACKGROUND**

The Northeast Monsoon over Northern and Central Luzon and the Tail –End of a Cold Front over Southern Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao which prevailed since January 1 to present triggered the occurrence of heavy rains in some parts of the country. These weather disturbances resulted in the occurrence of floodings, flashfloods, landslides, sea mishaps, storm surge and diseases outbreak in 27 provinces of ten (10) affected regions. **(Details on Tab A)**

#### **B. AREAS AND POPULATION AFFECTED (Details on Tab B)**

A total of **394,065 families / 1,972,433 persons** were affected in **2,188** barangays of **189** municipalities and **18** cities in the provinces of Palawan in Region IV-B; Albay, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, Catanduanes and Sorsogon in Region V; Negros Occidental in Region VI; Cebu and Bohol in Region VII; Eastern Samar, Leyte, Northern Samar, Western Samar, and Southern Leyte in Region VIII; Lanao del Norte and Misamis Occidental in Region X; Compostela Valley, Davao del Norte, Davao del Sur and Davao Oriental in Region XI; South Cotabato in Region XII; Agusan del Norte, Agusan del Sur, Dinagat Islands, Surigao del Norte, and Surigao del Sur in CARAGA; and Maguindanao in ARMM.

Status of Evacuees: As of 28 January 2011 - **1,496 families / 6,790 persons** are still housed at **50** evacuation centers

#### **C. CASUALTIES (Details on Tab C)**

A total of **110** casualties were reported in **nine (9)** regions, broken down as follows: **75 dead** due to drowning, landslide, electrocution, and hypothermia; **13 injured** due to landslides and flashflood; and **22 missing** due to flashfloods and maritime incidents

#### **D. DAMAGED HOUSES (Details on Tab D)**

**The total number of damaged houses is 5,353: 753 Totally and 4,600 Partially.**

#### **E. DAMAGES TO PROPERTIES (AGRICULTURE, INFRASTRUCTURE AND PRIVATE PROPERTIES (Details on Tab E)**

The estimated cost of damages to agriculture, infrastructure and private properties amounted to **PhP2,052,866,000** broken down as follows: Agriculture **PhP659,533,146**; Infrastructure **PhP 1,372,286,553**; and Private Properties **PhP21,046,300**. Breakdown per region is as follows: PhP5,541,018 in Region IV-B; PhP679,111,884 in Region V; PhP9,634,510 in Region VI; PhP700,000 in Region VII; PhP465,012,997 in Region VIII; PhP68,664,499 in Region IX; PhP31,105,951 in Region X; PhP148,675,352 in Region XI; and PhP644,419,788 in CARAGA

## **II. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT**

The NDRRMC conducted an emergency meeting on January 03, 2011. It was presided by USEC Benito Ramos, Executive Director of NDRRMC and Administrator, OCD and attended by NDRRMC Member-Agencies, namely: PAGASA, AFP, DOH, DBM, PIA, DSWD, DPWH, PNP, PCG, PMS, OCD Division Chiefs and OCD Regional Directors. Issues and concerns on the consequences of the prevailing disasters and how to address immediately the needs and requirements in the flood-stricken areas were discussed.

The NDRRMC Operations Center (NDRRMC OpCen) was activated into an emergency operation center (EOC) under red alert status. The representatives of implementing agencies like AFP, PNP, PCG, DSWD and DOH rendered duty at NDRRMC OpCen for easy coordination and monitoring of actions on the requirements in the field, conduct of damage assessments and provision/delivery of assistance by the concerned agencies and OCD Regional Centers IV-A, IV-B, V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, X, XI, CARAGA and ARMM to the disaster-stricken areas.

On January 14, 2011, His Excellency President Benigno C. Aquino III together with Secretaries Voltaire Gazmin, DND/Chairperson, NDRRMC; Dinky Soliman, DSWD; Proceso Alcala, DA; Enrique Ona, DOH; Rogelio Singson, DPWH; Jesus Robredo, DILG; Edwin Lacierda, Presidential Spokesperson; and USEC Benito Ramos, Executive Director, NDRRMC and Administrator, OCD, visited CARAGA, Region V and Region VIII to oversee the extent of damages and check the status of disaster operations being conducted by the local agencies. The respective RDRRMCs conducted conferences/briefings which were participated in by its member-agencies, selected LGUs and media. Details of the President's directives/pronouncements during His visit were reflected in **Tab F**.

The NDRRMC Member Agencies, through their respective regional and local offices/units, effectively managed the Search and Rescue (SAR), retrieval, evacuation, airlift/relief, clearing operations, early recovery as well as damage and needs assessment and emergency repairs of damaged infrastructures.

### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS ARE AS FOLLOWS:**

#### **A. SEARCH AND RESCUE (SAR), RETRIEVAL AND EVACUATION OPERATIONS**

The AFP, PNP, PCG, and LGUs concerned had evacuated **22,552 families / 99,577 persons** to **307 evacuation centers (Details on Tab G)**. A total of **470** fishermen were rescued out of the **514** reported missing due to 31 maritime incidents in Regions II, III, IV-A, IV-B, V, VI, VII and ARMM. Of the 31 incidents, 19 SAR operations were completed and 12 are still on-going. **(Details on Tab H)**.

#### **B. RELIEF AND RECOVERY OPERATIONS**

The estimated cost of assistance on Food and Non-food Items (NFIs) from the resources of DSWD, LGUs and NGOs/Other GOs and on health logistical expenditures from DOH and INGOs has amounted to **PhP 42,601,736.37**. **(Details on Tab I)**

Relief and recovery operations were effectively managed in various affected regions through the efforts of the following agencies and emergency responders. **Complete details of relief and recovery efforts on Tab J:**

**DSWD** mobilized/deployed its Regional QRTs and SWAD Teams to assist the affected LGUs in the disaster operations; prepositioned assorted relief supplies (food and NFIs) for augmentation and distribution in various DSWD Field Offices, master listing of evacuees, reporting and monitoring of donated goods received to ensure proper distribution.

**Cost of assistance in terms of Food and Non-Food Items is PhP38,271,607.01**

**DOH-HEMS** was fully activated to include all its field response teams and PHTO-Based Response Teams in CHDs IV-B, V, VI, VII, VIII, X, XI and CARAGA; augmented and delivered drugs, medicines, medical supplies, WASH logistical supplies (water testing reagents and disinfectants), family kits, first aid kits in various CHDs. Respective CHDs intensified dissemination of health advisory on water sanitation, leptospirosis and household water disinfection in various evacuation centers through distribution of flyers and the various Provincial Health Teams (PHTs) conducted rapid health assessment and disease surveillance and prevention in all affected regions

**Health/WASH Logistical Expenditures - PhP4,330,129.36**

**LGUs, DPWH, AFP, PNP and PCG** delivered other basic services such as: transport of relief goods (by land, air and sea) to the disaster-stricken regions, clearing operations, security assistance and immediate repairs of damaged infrastructure facilities.

Relief operations were terminated in Regions VII and X on January 11, 2011, Regions IV-B and VI on January 13, 2011 and Catanduanes on January 22, 2011.

#### **NGO and INGOs**

**Zuellig Pharma Corporation** donated 19 boxes of medicines to Region V containing Vidaylin Gummies with Garden Vegetables 30's Bio-enhanced Calcium Plus Cap 30's

**UNFPA** provided 1,000 Hygiene kits to CHD V, distributed in Albay for implementation of minimum initial service package for reproductive health of women in crisis in evacuation centers in Albay, with pregnant and lactating women as the target population.

**WFP and ACF** sent a mission to Albay to prepare food assistance for the 41,121 families mostly fisherfolks, rice farmers and coastal families whose livelihoods were disrupted by heavy rains.

**The Lions Club International District 301-A2** thru the Legaspi City Host Lions Club and the Camalig Lions Club conducted relief operations and distributed relief goods in Camalig and Sto. Domingo, Albay on January 27, 2011

### **C. REGIONAL INITIATIVES (Details on Tab K)**

The RDRRMCs and local DRRMCs' Chairpersons in Regions IV-B, V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, X, XI, XII, CARAGA and ARMM orchestrated the emergency management such as search and rescue, evacuation, relief operations, conduct of emergency meetings and disseminations of warnings to the public in the flood and landslide-stricken areas.

### **D. DECLARATION OF STATE OF CALAMITY (Details on Tab L)**

- The local government units in Regions V, VI, VIII, XI and CARAGA have declared their respective areas under a State of Calamity through the Sangguniang Panlalawigan / Panlungsod/Bayan/Barangay. **Eight (8)** Provinces, **6** Cities, **8** Municipalities, and **3** Barangays were declared under a State of Calamity. **As of January 28, 2011 report, State of Calamity was also declared in Mandaue City on January 26, 2011, Cebu City on January 28, 2011 and Bohol Province on January 27, 2011**

### **III. Current Situations in CARAGA, Region VII and VIII**

#### **CARAGA**

- ❖ **Landslide occurred in Brgy. Laurel, Tagana-an and in Brgy. Banbanon in San Francisco, Surigao del Norte on January 26, 2011 at 6:00 PM.**

- ❖ As of 28 January 2011 5PM report, a total of 225 families/ 1,089 persons were evacuated in 2 municipalities, namely; Mainit (171 families/855 persons) and Surigao City (54 families/234 persons) of Surigao del Norte.
- ❖ Sixty five (65) barangays in nine (9) municipalities of Surigao del Norte and one (1) municipality of Dinagat islands were affected by flood
- ❖ One (1) person, identified as Amado Basadre, 30-40 yrs old from Brgy Honrado, San Francisco, Surigao del Norte was reported missing while attempting to cross a river but caught by the strong current of water.
- ❖ A total of forty-four (44) houses were damaged in 2 municipalities, namely; Claver, Surigao del Norte (18 partially) and Libjo, Dinagat islands(25 partially and 1 totally)
- ❖ A bridge in Libjo, Dinagat Islands was damaged with an estimated amount of P100,000.00
- ❖ Classes in Elementary and Secondary Schools in Dinagat Islands and Surigao del Norte were still suspended on January 27, 2011
- ❖ Suspension of work for the capitol employees in Surigao del Norte was declared.
- ❖ Jubgan Bridge in Malimono, Surigao del Norte was rendered impassable and the newly constructed footbridge has been washed-out
- ❖ The road along the National Highway in Mapaso, Placer, Surigao del Norte was also rendered impassable

#### **Actions Taken**

- ❖ Clearing operations was undertaken by the Municipal Engineering Office. **PDRPMC Dinagat Islands and CDRPMC Surigao City raised alert level 2 at 5 AM 28 January 2011 in their respective areas**
- ❖ PDRPMC Surigao del Norte organized five (5) response teams assigned at the 5 zones in the province and directed PSWDO to preposition relief goods

#### **Region VII**

##### **Cebu**

- ❖ **Transcentral Highway along Brgys. Busay, Malubog, and Tabunan in Cebu City are already passable after landslide debris were removed**
- ❖ **The Carcar-Barili road along Brgy Guadalupe in Carcar City is already passable**

##### **Negros Oriental**

- ❖ **The Dumaguete North road at Brgy. Hilaitan in Negros Oriental is half lane closed but passable**

##### **Bohol**

- ❖ **Landslides occurred in Brgys. Tubog and Mayana, both in Jagna along the Jagna-Sierra Bullones road which is hardly passable.**

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PRESIDENT'S VISIT  
As of 29 January 2011, 6:00 AM**

On January 14, 2011, His Excellency President Benigno C. Aquino III together with Voltaire Gazmin, National Defense Secretary/Chairperson, NDRRMC; Dinky Soliman, DSWD Secretary; Proceso Alcala, DA Secretary; Enrique Ona, DOH Secretary; Rogelio Singson, Secretary DPWH; Jesus Robredo, DILG Secretary; Edwin Lacierda, Presidential Spokesperson; and USEC Benito Ramos, Executive Director, NDRRMC and Administrator, OCD, visited three (3) regions that were heavily affected by landslides and floods namely: CARAGA, Region V and Region VIII to oversee the extent of damages and personally check the status of the on-going relief operations being conducted by local agencies in the ground.

Upon arrival of the President, respective RDRRMCs in afore-said regions conducted conferences/briefings participated by respective member agencies, selected LGUs and media.

#### **CARAGA**

- ❖ Chairperson, RDRRMC CARAGA briefed the President on the effects focused on background, impact, response action, post-disaster requirements and future plans
- ❖ The President commented that post disaster requirements should be prioritized and rehabilitation of damaged infrastructure has to be referred to the DPWH and further emphasized that the national government will do its part in supporting the LGUs but initiatives should be done first at the LGU level; turned over certified rice seeds, water pump engines and assorted medicines to the affected areas through the Chairpersons of the provincial and city DRRMCs
- ❖ After the turn-over of resources, media interview followed on the issue of illegal logging

#### **Region V**

- ❖ PAGASA V reported that La Niña peak is expected to affect the Bicol Region for the next 3 months
- ❖ PDRRMC Catanduanes / MDRRMC Pandan requested for augmentation in the search and rescue operations from PN, TOG5, PCG and PNP for the missing fishermen in Catanduanes who went fishing on 12 midnight 15 January 2011. SAR operation conducted by barangay residents were suspended due to strong waves and winds.
- ❖ The LGUs likewise appealed for support to their rehabilitation and immediate repair of damaged roads; alternative livelihood for economically displaced fishermen from coastal and inland municipalities; food for work programs; and wider coverage of national support for PHILHEALTH beneficiaries
- ❖ President Aquino re-assured that the DPWH has already been instructed to prioritize list of infrastructures for immediate repair/rehabilitation using the NCF and that the Administration is looking to provide the immediate needs of affected communities to include livelihood support like cash-for-work programs

#### **Region VIII**

- ❖ The President directed concerned agencies to assist /help Saint Bernard in the acquisition of lot for relocation sites
- ❖ RDRRMC/OCD Region VIII to ensure that LGUs must strictly observe the stockpiling procedure of basic necessities of the evacuees
- ❖ RDRRMC report must show and or project the total clear picture of the region based on the reported data

**Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP)**

- ❖ CSAFP directed COMSOLCOM to provide one (1) UH-1H Heli for use of OCD V for the urgent conduct of rapid assessment in the province of Camarines Sur particularly in Siruma. Said Heli was pre-positioned at TOG 5 Legaspi City at 1300H 15 Jan 2011
- ❖ **The Philippine Air Force (PAF)** provided three (3) PAF aircrafts (UH-1H): one (1) used by OCD-5/PDRRMC Albay in the conduct of aerial survey and inspection in Cagraray Islands in Albay; one used in the conduct of aerial survey and clearing operations in Southern Leyte, Eastern Samar and Western Samar; and one (1) for SAR operations in Catanduanes for the recovery of 5 missing fishermen thereat; organized search and rescue operations headed by Commander Joel Babas using one (1) Islander fixed-wing aircraft for the conduct of SAR in Catanduanes; and conducted joined aerial reconnaissance aboard one (1) UH 1H Heli under TOG 5 at Brgy. Baldoc, Pandan, Catanduanes. **Provided 1 rescue team with rubber boat which conducted rescue and evacuation of residents in Mandaue City in close coordination with PNP and LGU thereat**
- ❖ **The Philippine Navy (PN)** directed all stations and detachments to place respective DRGs on standby for possible SAR operations. DRU 207<sup>th</sup> / 505<sup>th</sup> SRG, 9ID, PA, 901<sup>st</sup> Bde, 902<sup>nd</sup> Bde and 903<sup>rd</sup> Bde established close coordination with Chairpersons, RDRRMC Regions IV-A, IV-B, V, VIII, X, CARAGA; and assisted in the distribution of relief goods in various flood and landslide-stricken areas, PN V provided transportation and security services during the delivery of relief goods from DSWD Warehouse to PG374 and PG378 at Legaspi City Pier and at Batan Island, Rapu-Rapu, Albay; and provided press release/media interview in connection with the on-going relief operation at Batan Island, Rapu Rapu, Albay and the SAR operations in Catanduanes. NAVFORSOL dispatched DF338 to a vicinity of 10 NM SW off Pasacao Port to rescue a fishing boat with 4 fishermen onboard from being drifted by strong winds and current on 11:25 AM 25 January 2011. Said navy rescue operations was successful, fisherman were rescued safely
- ❖ **The Philippine Army (PA)** Special Forces deployed Hoover Craft Air Boats donated by the Australian Government to Liguasan Marsh in Maguindanao Province for use in the on-going disaster operations; The 901<sup>st</sup> IBde PA committed 4 vehicles (2M35, 2 km 450)) and 11 on call vehicles (6 M35 trucks, 4 km 450, 1 Elf from 901, 2IB, 7SRC, 3 RCDG and 5FSSU) and 16 personnel; **PA V** distributed potable water; assisted the relief operations at Brgy. Puro, Legaspi City; and continuously providing transportation/security support to the evacuation efforts of affected provinces in the region. The CENTCOM OPCON units conducted disaster response operations and deployed 4 platoons: 14IB, PA in Jipapad, Eastern Samar; DCoy 52CBn, PA in Taft, Eastern Samar; TG Gabay 801Bde, PA in Hinabangan, Western Samar; and 14 IB PA in Taft Eastern Samar. The **9ID PA V** continued the distribution of relief goods in the flooded municipalities of Castilla, Juban, Pilar, Irosin, Casiguran, Sorsogon City all in Sorsogon and provinces of Catanduanes and Masbate; and prepositioned 4 M35 trucks, 4 km 450, 15 Officers, 282 enlisted personnel and 1 mini cruiser jeep. The **75<sup>th</sup> IB** of the 401<sup>st</sup> BDE, 26<sup>th</sup> IB of the 402<sup>nd</sup> BDE, and 52<sup>nd</sup> Engineering Brigade in CARAGA augmented vehicles and military personnel in SAR, evacuation and relief operations. PA-9ID TF SAGIP dispatched: Two (2) M35 trucks to Albay APSEMO and transported 76 sacks of rice to Brgys Calaguimit and Casinagan of Oas, Albay on January 21; One (1) KM450 and one (1) M35 truck with troops of DRRU-9ID together with ABS-CBN representative conducted relief operations in Sitio Tampi, Brgy Binuananan, Juban, Sorsogon on January 22.
- ❖ **TFSSU, PA provided M35 trucks utilized to transport the rubber boats from HQS CGD-CEV in Arellano Blvd., Cebu City enroute to the flooded areas in Mandaue City and back to Cebu**

### **Philippine National Police (PNP)**

- ❖ **PNP** activated its Police Regional Disaster Operations Center (PRDOC) in close coordination with the RDRRMC Operation Centers; assisted in disseminating warning advisories to the local Chief Executives, local DRRMC Action Officers, RDRRMC member agencies and local radio and television stations thru fax, and text; alerted its regional SAR teams and equipment on standby; provided direction and control in the conduct of operations in various regions; and initiated the conduct of SAR, retrieval, evacuation and relief operations in the provinces of Albay, Sorsogon, Camarines Sur, Catanduanes; St. Bernard, Southern Leyte, Agusan del Sur and Butuan City through its regional units: Deployable Response Group (DRG) of CGS Legaspi, DRG Team with 2 sets of diving gears aboard CGS Masbate and CGs Sorsogon are still on standby ready for deployment
- ❖ **PNP-PRO V** placed on alert standby sixty (60) personnel from Regional Public Safety Bn 5 (PPO and CPO), SKW Cargo Truck and H-Lux Patrol Car; deployed SAR equipment (rubber boat, life vest and ropes) to landside and flood-stricken areas in Albay, Sorsogon and Camarines Sur; dispatched 30 RPSB5 personnel to PDRRMC Albay to assist in repacking of relief goods; assisted in evacuating the 8,259 families / 37,631 persons in Albay and Sorsogon; PPO Albay with two (2) rescue units assisted motorist in Sto. Domingo; and the Municipal Police Station (MPS) of Manito, Albay conducted SAR on the reported missing
- ❖ **PNP-PRO VIII** - Elements of Southern Leyte Police Office participated in the evacuation of 392 families / 1,504 persons in flooded areas of the province; PNP St. Bernard conducted safety/monitoring operations in affected barangays and evacuation centers; and assisted the LGUs and NGAs in road clearing and relief operations
- ❖ **PNP-PRO CARAGA** deployed 1,296 personnel, 73 patrol cars, 6 units 6x6 trucks, 1 ambulance and 3 rubber boats to assist in evacuation, SAR and relief operations in various provinces; and conducted traffic, direction and control in the conduct of SAR and relief operations. Elements of PPO in Agusan del Sur assisted in the evacuation of affected families in the low-lying barangays and participated in the SAR operations; RPSB CARAGA led by P/SUPT Francisco Dungo Jr., BATCOM conducted SAR operations in Brgy. Lemon and Brgy. Mahay in Butuan City
- ❖ **As of 27 January 2011, placed on alert standby 60 5<sup>th</sup> Regional Public Safety Battalion (5RPSB) personnel for possible deployment as the need arises**

### **Philippine Coast Guard (PCG)**

- ❖ **PCG Headquarters** rescue assets such as: 1 PCG Islander Aircraft, 1 PCG HELI and 4 teams of DRG were placed on standby/ready for dispatch. PCG Districts: **CGD Palawan, CGD BICOL, CGD Central Eastern Visayas and CGD Northern Mindanao** dispatched their respective SAR assets such as: Rescue Team of SOG Divers, SOG personnel and Teams of Deployable Response Group (DRG) in respective areas of responsibility and assisted in the conduct of search and rescue, retrieval, and evacuation operations and relief distribution
- ❖ **Commander, CGD BICOL (CGDBCL)** requested to higher headquarters the deployment of PCG vessel or craft, additional diving equipment and paraphernalia and to permanently detail a medical team as part of rescue capability and response to any SAR related emergencies in various CG stations; dispatched teams of DRGs' SOG personnel, medical teams, SAR equipment and M-35 trucks to assist/augment emergency responders in Albay, Sorsogon, Catanduanes, Camarines Sur, Camarines Norte and Masbate. **CGD Masbate** rescued two (2) motorized bancas (MBCA GANI and MBCA CAMIL) with 8 fishermen from Balatan, Camarines Sur at the vicinity of Animisola Island, Masbate. **CG Detachment Pasacao** and a team from the Office of the Mayor of Balatan, Camarines Sur jointly conducted SAR operation at the vicinity waters off Animisola Island, Masbate and rescued two (2) motorized Bancas namely **MBca Gani and MBca Camil** and successfully rescued the eight (8) fishermen namely: Oscar Recarte, Giovanni Recarte, Loloy Coralde, Rachel Riflora, Danilo Tejares, Danny Tejares, Boyet Barraquel and Ricardo Riflora, all of legal age and resident of Brgy. Duran, Balatan, Camarines Sur
- ❖ **CG D Palawan (CGDPAL)** dispatched 1 rescue team of SOG Divers to Brgys El Vita and Paracan, Narra, Palawan and conducted SAR operations

- ❖ **CGD Central Eastern Visayas** (CGDCEV) deployed 1 team of Deployable Response Group (DRG) from Maasin Coast Guard Station to Brgy. Pulot Pulot, Saint Bernard and four (4) SOG personnel from HQ, SOG augmented the rescue responders in CGS Maasin to support and assist in the conduct of SAR operations thereat
- ❖ **CGD Northern Mindanao** (CGDNM) dispatched 1 Team of SOG Divers to Brgy Buhangin, Butuan City and four SOG personnel from HQ, SOG augmented the rescue responders of CGDNM Butuan City in the conduct of SAR operations thereat
- ❖ PCG HQ issued NOTAM thru NAVTEX alerting all ships/watercrafts/aircrafts to be on the lookout for the missing US sailboat "Pineapple". **a twin hulled 38-footer Catamaran Sailboat** which departed Guam from Marianas Yacht Club on 6 January 2011. PCG Islander conducted series of aerial surveillance and SAR operations and said sailboat was spotted north northwest of Dinagat Island along Surigao Strait on 23 January 2011, its exact location was along the sea vicinity of Kanhandon Point, Hibuson Island, Hinundayan, Southern Leyte. The US Coast Guard likewise confirmed that they established contact with its five (5) crews/passengers safely onboard, identified as **Joe Gamec, Corey Goldhorn, Prandy Pratz, Steven Blanton and Chris Bell**. SARV escorted "The Pineapple" to the port of Maasin for refuelling

#### **Local Government Units (LGUs)**

- ❖ **PDRRMCs concerned** in various provinces of Regions V, VI, VIII, VIII, X, XI, XII and CARAGA conducted a pre-emptive evacuations in the critical barangays of affected municipalities

**Food and Non-Food Items**

- ❖ **DSWD-CO** mobilized/deployed its Regional QRTs and SWAD Teams to assist the affected LGUs in the disaster operations; allocated Php 4.04M as stand-by funds for LGUs; pre-positioned Php 29.27M worth of stand-by funds, family packs, other food and non-food items in all concerned DSWD-FOs ready available for augmentation support; and released a truckload of food and non-food items to DSWD FO V from the DSWD National Resource Operations Center (NROC)
- ❖ DSWD relief operations were terminated: in Regions VII and X on January 11, 2011 and in Regions IV-B and VI on January 13, 2011
- ❖ DSWD FO-V delivered 160 boxes of high energy biscuit to Juban, Sorsogon; terminated relief operation in Catanduanes on January 22 at 2:00 PM; and has sufficient family food packs and stockpile of relief commodities composed of food and non-food ready for additional augmentation assistance and pre-positioned sacks of rice for affected areas
- ❖ **DSWD VIII** provided 500 family food packs, 500 packs clothing and 10 boxes of mineral water to St. Bernard; and 30 family packs and 30 packs clothing to the 30 families in Barangays East and West, Baueun, Leyte; allocated 400 family packs and 400 packs of clothing for the flood/landslide victims in the region. PSWD Eastern Samar allocated family food pack and used clothing to Maslog and Jipapad at 500 food packs and 500 packs used clothing in each municipality; SWAD team in Southern Leyte continuously coordinate with the MDRRMC St. Bernard on the status of relief distribution, master listing of evacuees, reporting and monitoring of donated goods received to ensure proper distribution

- ❖ **DSWD CARAGA** provided relief augmentation in San Francisco, Agusan del Sur in the form of 1,000 family packs
- ❖ **PDRRMC Camarines Sur** has standby 7,000 food packs and prepared additional 2,000 food packs as requested by Mayor Sandy Ondis of Siruma. **Provided food assistance in the following municipalities of Camarines Sur: Siruma (700 food packs, 10 folding beds and 200 water jugs); Caramoran (2,241 food packs in 9 barangays); Presentacion (1,008 food packs, 520 used clothing and 520 used blankets ); and Garchitorena (6,000 food packs in 23 barangays)**
- ❖ **AFP Philippine Navy** conducted the following: relief operations at Cagraray Island, Bacacay, Albay (650 food packs); and Tabaco City (260 food packs) in support to the Food For Work program for the economically displaced fisherfolk in the area, and participated in the Medical and Dental Mission at the Brgys. Tinapian and Manumbalay, Manito, Albay spearheaded by DOH5 and LGU
- ❖ **NFSL PN** transported 250 food packs from DSWD Legazpi City to Rapu-Rapu, Albay for distribution to flood affected residents in the island
- ❖ **PDRRMC Lanao del Norte** and MDRRMCs Baroy, Lala and Tubod and NGOs distributed food and non-food items to 2,584 families: families in Baroy and Tubod received food packs from Rep. Imelda Dimaporo and 655 families received medicines from Rep. Aliah Dimaporo. LGUs Oroqueta City and Ozamiz City only provided assistance to those who are in need
- ❖ The **LGU** & local populace of Paly Island provided foods and clothing to the survivors of FB Finely



- ❖ **OCD IV-B** is monitoring the status of the victims and coordinating with DSWD IV-B, WESCOM PDRRMC Palawan
- ❖ **TOG5 PAF** conducted 2 relief operations sorties in Camarines Norte and delivered 25 sacks of rice and boxes of assorted relief supplies and medicines for 1,000 residents of Brgy. Mangcawayan, Calaguas Island, Vinzons, Camarines Norte
- ❖ **PSWDO** delivered 76 sacks of rice to the LGU Oas
- ❖ RDRRMC Team composed of OCD RD V, Task Force Sagip, Commander, RD DOH-V, Philippine Navy, AFP and PDRRMC Camarines Sur Personnel proceeded to Camarines Sur via PAF Aircraft to conduct rapid assessment in Siruma and delivered 300 boxes of mineral water and 100 boxes of electrolytes to affected population in Brgy. Butawan, Siruma
- ❖ Another PAF Aircraft ferried DOH 5 Medical Team and emergency medical supplies to Brgy. Butawan, Siruma, Camarines Sur. The team set-up and manned the satellite hospital and addressed the life-threatening condition of about four hundred fifty (450) households who are affected by diarrhea
- ❖ **DPWH**, through its Maintenance Engineering Crew in various affected regions, has undertaken the following activities: removal and clearing of debris and rock/slides; installation of barricades and warning signs along the national and secondary roads; de-clogging of culverts/ditches and removal of debris along bridge waterways; and emergency repairs of roads
- ❖ **DPWH CARAGA** conducted immediate repair, installed safety warning signs on damaged road sections for public safety and convenience
- ❖ **DENR** issued a memorandum to all PENROs, CENROs, EMB and MGB in all regions to monitor landslides and flood prone areas in respective AORs to advise the people to be vigilant
- ❖ **DILG CARAGA** reiterated the implementation of Memorandum Circular No. 2010-79 dated August 24, 2010 re: Calamity Response Protocols and Associated Actions to ensure an active local government compliance of said issuance

## **Department of Health (DOH)**

### **Health and WASH**

- ❖ **DOH-HEMS-OPCEN** declared Health Emergency Code White Alert and fully activated to include all field response teams and PHTO-Based Response Teams in CHDs IV-B, V, VI, VII, VIII, X, XI and CARAGA; pre-positioned and augmented assorted medicines, medical supplies, water testing reagents, disinfectants, family kits first aid kits and WATSAN logistics in various CHDs; Respective CHDs intensified dissemination of health advisory on water sanitation, leptospirosis and household water disinfection in various evacuation centers through distribution of flyers; Various Provincial Health Teams (PHTs) conducted rapid health assessment and disease surveillance and prevention in all affected regions
- ❖ At a RDRRMC Region V meeting on 24 January 2011, DOH5 sees as long term solution to the diarrhea cases the advocacy of proper hygiene and sanitation through education of the population and installation of sanitary toilets and water sources through the help of NGOs
- ❖ **CHD Bicol** assisted President Aquino in his visit to various affected areas and in the distribution of 200 Hygiene kits from UNFPA, 150 Family and 100 First Aid Kits from DOH-HEMS in the evacuation centers and the rest was turned over to Gov. Joey Salceda for other municipalities. Based on surveillance conducted by PHO Albay, there were 718 cases reported: 334 cases of upper respiratory tract infection; 58 headache, 53 athlete's foot, 16 fever, 38 asthma, 20 bronchitis, 12 arthritis, 14 UTI, 3 skin disease, 16 wounds, 12 vascular disease, 30 hypertension and 110 acute respiratory infection. Number of pregnant (30) and lactating mother (29). As of 15 January 2011, the top 3 leading cases of morbidity seen in all evacuation camps were cough and colds (52 cases), upper respiratory tract infections (33) and headaches (30) In the **RDRRMC V** meeting on 24 January 2011, DOH5 said that the long term solution to the diarrhea cases is advocacy of proper hygiene and sanitation through

education of the population and the installation of sanitary toilets and water sources through the help of NGOs

- ❖ **CHD VIII** assisted President Aquino in his visit to affected areas and in the distribution of assorted drugs and medicines worth PhP 35,000 in Samar and Leyte. Provinces; provided technical assistance in terms of health emergency management and assisted LGUs on health situation assessment in the evacuation camps and in the daily surveillance activity inside and outside evacuation centers. RHEMS Coordinator of CHD VIII reported that based on disease surveillance conducted, the leading cause of consultation in 39 evacuation centers in Saint Bernard, Southern Leyte were cough and colds with fever, fever, diarrhea and hypertension while in Brgy. Bato, Borongan, Eastern Samar were acute respiratory infection, lacerated wounds, diarrhea, skin disease and pneumonia. There are only one (1) fixed consultation clinic in the evacuation center in Brgy. New Guinsaugon. Evacuees in other centers had their medical consultation at the RHU with Anahawan District Hospital as the core referral hospital
- ❖ Environmental sanitation in St. Bernard, Southern Leyte and affected communities in Eastern Samar: water supply is treated with chlorine and is managed by the LGU; distributed water jugs in evacuation centers and affected communities, latrines are adequate as reported by MHO; and the garbage is collected every day
- ❖ Health services: conducted measles immunization, nutritional status in some children is poor; consultation is conducted in every evacuation center manned by DOH Representatives, MHO, PHP Staff 24/7 basis; health education (provided with IEC materials); and response team is composed of 1 Doctor, 3 Nurses, 1 Engineer and 3 Support Staff
- ❖ **CHD IV-B** provided medical and technical assistance to the latest victims of flashflood in Narra, Palawan
- ❖ **CHD XI** conducted rapid health assessment, consultation and immunization and provided assorted drugs and medicines and supplies to the evacuees in Brgy. Darong, Sta Cruz, Davao del Sur
- ❖ **CHD CARAGA** assisted President Aquino in His visit to affected areas and augmentation of 3 sets of drugs and medicines in Agusan del Sur, Butuan City and Surigao del Sur. **The PHTs in CARAGA** distributed pre-positioned medicines and fluids to the affected provinces
- ❖ **Zuellig Pharma Corporation** donated 19 boxes of medicines to Region V containing Vidaylin Gummies with Garden Vegetables 30's Bio-enhanced Calcium Plus Cap 30's f and **UNFPA** provided 1,000 Hygiene kits to CHD V, distributed in Albay for implementation of minimum initial service package for reproductive health of women in crisis in evacuation centers in Albay, with pregnant and lactating women as the target population
- ❖ **DOH-CHD5** dispatched medical teams from BRTTH and AFP in Cawayan, Manito with medical supplies from CHD Bicol worth PhP 60,000
- ❖ **PDRMC Camarines Sur**, through TOG 5 PAF and PA trucks, transported the following resources to Siruma, Camarines Sur in connection with diarrhea cases thereat consisting of 370 boxes Summit mineral water; 100 boxes energy drinks; 1,000 food packs, assorted drugs/medicines, and 4 health teams. GMA Kapuso Foundation also provided 1,000 food packs. 30 pcs water jugs, 20 pcs water container, 60 bottles summit mineral water for use of medical team and PA; 1 container unleaded gasoline for generator, 2 units emergency lights, 2 medical tank (oxygen), and antibiotics
- ❖ **DOH HEMS** together with RD-OCD 5 proceeded to Siruma to transport Emergency Medical Team and to set up/man satellite hospital to address the life-threatening condition of about 450 households who were affected by diarrhea in Siruma and received donations from PHAP Cares Foundation Inc.: 132 packs (11 cartons x 12 packs) of J & J Pure Essentials 60g soap pack with Modess (4 soaps + 8 pads)

- ❖ PAF TOG5 conducted aerial survey over high risk landslide prone areas in Albay with OCD-RD V, C, Albay PDRRMC onboard and other Albay team members including 2 French Cameramen
- ❖ **RDRRMC Region V** conducted coordinating conference during the visit of His Excellency President Benigno C. Aquino III in Legaspi City on 14 January 2011
- ❖ **RDRRMC V** conducted Press Conference with C, Albay PDRRMC, PAF TOG5 Group Commander and Media in connection with Search and Rescue (SAR) operations in Catanduanes
- ❖ **OCD-RD V** presided a press conference with representatives from DOH-CHD5, 9ID PA, NAVFORSOL PN, TOG5 PAF, PCGD Bicol and PRO5-PNP on the current SAR operations of missing fishermen in Bicol region and the rising number of diarrhea cases in Siruma, Camarines Sur on 19 January 2011
- ❖ **OCD Region V** conducted on going coordination and dissemination of Weather Advisories to RDRRMCs, PDRRMCs, LGUs and local media for close monitoring of weather situation
- ❖ **OCD-RD V** provided daily media interview re preparations of the new weather disturbance; conducted consultation meeting with PAGASA and PDRRMCs Albay, Camarines Sur and Sorsogon; conducted relief operations in Brgys Tinapian and Cawayan, Manito, Albay in coordination with Governor Salceda of Albay, AFP Commander, 9ID, BGEN Marilou Salazar AFP; TF Sagip and 901IBde Commander, NAVFORSOL, PDRRMC Albay Staff National and Local Media; and proceeded to Catanduanes on January 11, 2011 to meet with C,PDRRMC Catanduanes to oversee SAR operations for the missing fishermen

- ❖ **DepEd V** ordered the suspension of classes in Elementary and High School levels in Legaspi City, Manito, Daraga, Camalig, Sto. Domingo, Malilipot and Bacacay both in public and private; coordinate with local school officials of DepEd in their area of responsibility; and advised Chairpersons, City/MDRRMC to properly implement Advisory No. 8 re suspension of classes
- ❖ **PDRRMC Catanduanes** is continuously monitoring SAR efforts in Panganiban, Catanduanes for the 5 missing fishermen assisted by NAVFORSOL and TOG 5 air assets and requested intervention for economically displaced households
- ❖ **LGUs of Manito, Sto Domingo, Camalig and Malilipot, Albay** effected a pre-emptive evacuation as part of its disaster preparedness and response activities in areas prone to floods, landslides and lahar flows. The families were provided with 5 kls of rice. Expanded assistance in terms of food for work packages to 41,121 economically displaced households, especially fisherfolks and coastal families and established clinic station per evacuation and free hospitalization for affected families. Mayor Volante of Malilipot, Albay distributed relief goods sponsored by Vice President Jejomar Binay to the 200 families in Brgy San Jose, Malilipot, Albay
- ❖ **PDRRMC Camarines Sur** issued Advisory on possible implementation of pre-emptive evacuation in the province in anticipation of possible flooding and landslides in 26 municipalities and prepared 2,000 food packs for distribution in Siruma and has stockpile of 2,000 sacks of rice. To address the economic impact of the bad weather condition of the fisherfolks,
- ❖ **PDRRMC Sorsogon** initiated pre-emptive evacuation of population at risks, provided meals and other relief goods to affected families and declared Juban under a State of Calamity
- ❖ **PDRRMC Chairmen Catanduanes and Camarines Norte** requested RDRRMC for air support to augment local SAR efforts
- ❖ **PCG 5** assisted PCG in validating information regarding missing fishermen, PCG SOG assets is prepositioned in Camarines Norte to augment local SAR
- ❖ **NAVFORSOL (PN)** deployed DRRU team in Camrines Norte to assist in SAR and set-up ACP in Daet airport
- ❖ **PRO V** conducted continuous monitoring relative to the prevailing weather situation in AOR and placed on alert sixty (60) Regional Public Safety Battalion (5RPSB) personnel for possible deployment to landslide and flashflood areas in the provinces of Albay, Sorsogon and Camarines Sur.

Food pack contains rice, sardines corned beef, beef loaf and noodles and Non Food Items (NFIs) such as: basin, cooking pots, frying pan, slippers, pail used clothing, mosquito nets, blankets, plastic mats, water containers and still assessing the needs for permanent shelter, agricultural, livelihood and other assistance; MDRRMC Lala provided 424 family packs consisting of 4.5 kgs rice, 3 pcs noodles and 2 tins of sardines; CDRRMC Ozamiz carried out pre-emptive evacuation prior to the occurrence of flooding; and CDRRMC Oroquieta prohibited the evacuees to go home thus families are still at evacuation centers
- ❖ PDRRMC Lanao del Norte and MDRRMCs Baroy, Lala and Tubod and NGOs distributed food and non-food items to a total of 2,584 families with amount value of Php747,260.00
