SUBJECT: Weather Outlook for JUNE 2013

Most climate models predict ENSO-neutral continuing through June-July-August of 2013.

The weather systems that are likely to affect the country for June are the Southwest Monsoon (SW), Intertropical Convergence Zone (TCZ), Low Pressure Areas (LPAs), ridge of High Pressure Areas (HPAs) and two (2) or three (3) tropical cyclones to enter the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR). Generally near normal rainfall conditions are expected during the next month except for some areas in central and eastern Luzon that may receive above normal rainfall and some patches of lands in northern Mindanao with below normal rainfall extending over some areas of central Visayas including Mindoro. Southwest monsoon will likely commence during the first half of June and may be followed by the onset of the rainy season.

Slightly cooler than normal air temperatures will likely be felt in most parts of the country. Predicted ranges will be as follows: 22°C – 35°C over Luzon, 16°C – 25°C over mountainous areas of Luzon, 24°C – 34°C over Visayas, 24°C – 33°C over Mindanao, and 18°C – 30°C over mountainous areas of Mindanao.

PAGASA will continue to monitor the day-to-day rainfall/weather conditions and the large-scale climatic patters that will affect the country. Meanwhile, the public is advised to take precautionary measures against floods and rain-induced landslides particularly over the western sections of the country as the onset of the rainy season will likely to start.

You are hereby directed to monitor the situation and undertake precautionary measures in your area of responsibility (AOR). Likewise, the public and the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (DRRMCs) are advised to take appropriate actions.

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Let us untiringly aim for zero casualties.
