#### I. SITUATION OVERVIEW

##### A. Chronology and Tracking

###### 16 September 2013

- The Low Pressure Area (LPA) located at 930 km East of Casiguran, Aurora, developed into a Tropical Depression (TD) and was named "Odette". It maintained its strength as it continued to move over the Philippine Sea

###### 17 September 2013

- TD "Odette" intensified into a Tropical Storm (TS) as it moved in the general direction of Northern Luzon. It intensified further and remained almost stationary

###### 18 September 2013

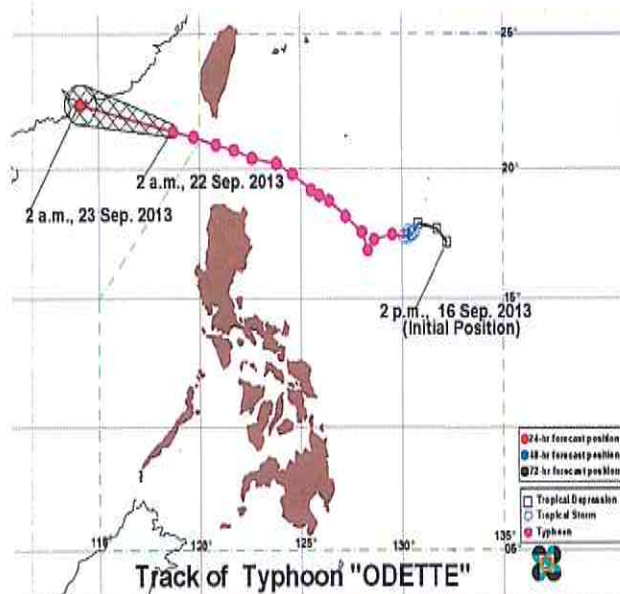
- TS "Odette" intensified into a Typhoon as it continued to move in the general direction of Northern Luzon

###### 19 September 2013

- Typhoon "Odette" intensified further as it continued to move closer towards Northern Luzon in a northwest direction

###### 20 September 2013

- Typhoon "Odette" maintained its strength as it continued to threaten the Northern Luzon area and gained more strength while moving towards the same direction. It accelerated and gained more strength as it moved closer to Extreme Northern Luzon



### 21 September 2013

- Typhoon "Odette" intensified while in the vicinity of the Batanes Group of Islands. It made its **landfall** at 7:00 AM over the southern part of Itbayat, Batanes

### 22 September 2013

- Typhoon "Odette" moved farther away from the country but continued to enhance the Southwest Monsoon and to bring moderate to occasionally heavy rains and thunderstorms over Metro Manila, MIMAROPA, and CALABARZON

## B. Tropical Cyclone Analysis

The maximum sustained winds of Typhoon "Odette" ranged from 45 kph to 195 kph, while its gustiness was from 80 kph to 210 kph. It accelerated and intensified as it reached maximum sustained winds of up to 215 kph and up to 250 kph gustiness when crossing and threatening extreme northern Luzon and when it entered the vicinity of Batanes and made landfall on 21 September 2013. The estimated rainfall reached up to 15 - 20 mm per hour (heavy intense) within the 900 km diameter of the typhoon.

## C. Affected Population (Tab B)

- A total of **17,041 families / 79,127 persons** were affected in **180 barangays** in **47 municipalities** and **3 cities** in **15 provinces** of Regions I, II, III, IV-B, V, VI, and CAR:

#### D. Flooded Areas

- Up to knee-level to chest-deep height of flooding were reported in some areas in Regions I, III, IV-A, IV-B, and VI due to continuous heavy rains brought about by TY "Odette"

#### E. Strandedes

- At the height of the typhoon, the highest peak number of passengers stranded has reached up to **56 passengers**, all from Cagayan (20 in Aparri and 36 in San Vicente); **One (1) stranded vessel**; and **9 stranded motorbancas**. **Ten (10) trips were cancelled** (4 in Aparri, 3 in San Vicente, and 3 in Claveria)

#### F. Status of Lifelines

##### • Dams

- Two (2) major dams in Benguet reached their critical levels. Two (2) gates of Ambuclao Dam were opened (1.0m) while Binga Dam opened 1 gate / 0.7 m on 21 September 2013. Gates of both dams were closed on 22 September 2013. Water levels in other major dams did not reach their critical levels

##### • Roads and Bridges

- Nine (9) road sections (2 in Region I, 1 in Region II, and 6 in CAR) were rendered impassable during the height of TY Odette. 4 Roads in CAR was impassable due to landslide and falling debris while the Balbalan-Pinukpuk Road in Benguet Regions I and II were rendered impassable due to floodwaters

##### • Power Outages

- Power interruptions were experienced in Ifugao, Kalinga, Apayao, and Baguio City in CAR; Batanes and Calayan Group of Islands; and Sablayan and Abra de Ilog in Occidental Mindoro for almost three (3) days

#### G. Damages

##### • Damaged Houses (Tab C)

- There were **3,463 houses damaged** in Regions I, II, IV-B, V, VI, and CAR (**586 totally / 2,877 partially**)

### III. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

#### A. Disaster Response

- **NDRRMOC** continuously monitored the situation in the affected areas of Typhoon "ODETTE" and the emergency relief and response efforts of various responders Likewise, requested for assets from the AFP for the conduct of aerial SAR operations
- **OCD Administrator and Chief, NDRRMOC** personal interviews with various media for any updates on the development of Typhoon "ODETTE" and its effects; and emergency preparedness and responses undertaken by the NDRRMOC/RDRRMCs member agencies and local DRRMCs

##### 1. Results of SAR, Retrieval and Evacuation Operations

- A total of **1,575 families / 6,657 persons** were **evacuated** to 24 evacuation centers established at the height of relief operations. Meanwhile, **14,080 family evacuees / 64,250 persons** opted to stay with their friends and relatives who were also served by the DSWD, DOH, LGUs, NGOs and other GOs
- A total of 15 (9 crews/passengers of M/V Mikee Rose, 6 crew members of unnamed fishing boat)

## 2. Relief and Recovery Operations

### ▪ Extent of Assistance

- A total of **PhP15,018,258.60** worth of relief assistance, and assorted relief goods were provided to the affected families: **PhP8,590,046.20** from DSWD, **PhP1,471,002.40** from LGUs, and **PhP4,957,210.00** from NGOs/Other GOs

## B. Warning Dissemination, Activation of Disaster Operations Centers (DOCs) and Prepositioning of Resources/Assets

### 1. NATIONAL

The NDRRMC member agencies, in coordination with their respective regional offices implemented activities in terms of warning dissemination, activation of DOCs and prepositioning of resources such as: manpower, logistics, and relief supplies.

NDRRM Operation Center upgraded NDRRMOC into an Emergency Operation Center (EOC) under **Red Alert Status** to:

- Disseminated Weather Bulletins and 24-Hour Public Weather Forecasts to all RDRRMCs/OCDCs through SMS, facsimile and websites for further dissemination to their respective Local DRRMCs from the provincial down to the municipal level

- Directed RDRRMCs concerned through the OCD Regional Centers to undertake precautionary measures in their respective areas of responsibilities (AOR)
- Alerted Detailed Duty Officers of NDRRMC member agencies to report to NDRRMOC for close coordination and monitoring on the preparedness /precautionary measures undertaken by respective agencies prior to the landfall of TY "Odette", and monitoring of the situation and effects with their respective local agencies

#### **Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical & Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA)**

- Continuously provided NDRRMOC with Weather Bulletins on Typhoon "Odette" from the time it entered PAR until it exited out of the country

#### **Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)**

- Prepositioned **P127.95 million** worth of emergency relief resources consisting of standby funds (P12.59 million), 26,118 family food packs (P7.49 million), and other food items (P107.87 million), readily available for augmentation to any type of disasters in Regions I, II, III, IV-A, IV-B, V, VIII, NCR, CAR, and NROC

##### **DSWD I**

- Pre-positioned 500 family packs per province; made available PhP300, 000 of QRF; implemented Cash-For-Work Program in flood-prone areas for canal/river de-clogging as flood mitigation activity; assessed and prepared identified evacuation centers and locations of community kitchen; and SWAD Team is actively involved. Further, the LGU of Banna and Dingras in Ilocos Norte initially provided PhP430.00 worth of food assistance to the affected constituents

##### **DSWD II**

- Has available standby funds worth PhP2,088,246.60, family food packs of 2,000 (PhP500,000.00), food (PhP22,000.00), and non-food items (PhP2,463,946.18), readily available for augmentation; prepositioned food and non-food items in 65 evacuation areas in the region; placed on standby CIU Social Workers and trained Stress Debriefers; provided forty (40) family food packs and four (4) boxes of bottled water to the stranded in Aparri, Cagayan; provided PhP1,179,236.00 worth of relief assistance to the affected families coming from the combined resources of DSWD (PhP1,164,236.00), and LGUs (PhP15,000.00); and deployed two (2) staff to the province of Batanes to conduct Rapid Damage Assessment and Needs Analysis on the extent of damages incurred by TY "Odette"

##### **DSWD III**

- In coordination with the local Government of Paniqui, Tarlac, provided PhP98,480.00 worth of food items (FIs) and non-food items (NFIs) to the affected families

##### **DSWD IV-B**

- Alerted all SWD Team Staff and Quick Response Teams in their respective provinces; prepositioned available stockpile in provincial warehouses for possible augmentation; and provided PhP70,300.00 worth of family food packs to the affected families in the municipalities of Abra de Ilog and Sablayan, Occidental Mindoro and LGUs (PhP93,600.00)

#### **DSWD VI**

- Provided food packs to the population affected by tornado and flooding in the region. The LGU of Bago City extended financial assistance to families with totally damaged houses at PhP3,000 each for partially damaged houses at PhP2,000.00 each; provided PhP3,250.00 worth of relief assistance coming from the Local Government of Bago City

#### **DSWD CAR**

- On alert status and placed SWAD Team on standby; prepositioned Php700,157.11 QRF and 3,571 family food packs at the provincial level; and collated the actual number of families affected (three (3) in Baguio City, two (2) in Tinoc, Ifugao and 78 in Lubuagan, Kalinga. The local government of Baguio City and Tinoc, Ifugao initially provided PhP4,833.20 worth of relief assistance to the affected constituents while DSWD-CAR extended two (2) family packs to the affected families in Tinoc, Ifugao

### **DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT (DILG)**

#### **DILG I**

- Coordinated with other agencies; disseminated, weather updates and advisories to LGUs; advised Municipal Local Government Operation Officer (MLGOOs) to render 24-hour duty to monitor the situation; and implemented pre-emptive evacuation in high risk areas if situation demands

### **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH (DOH)**

- **DOH HEMS OpCen** continuously monitored the situation through coordination with different CHDs

#### **DOH I**

- Activated its OpCen on 24-Hour bases; stockpiled medicines available at the regional and four (4) offices; organized medical response and health assessment teams composed of doctors, nurses and allied health professionals and placed them on standby at the regional and four (4) provincial offices ready for dispatch if situation warrants; and maintained direct coordination with the health clusters of four (4) PDRRMCs and 3 DOH retained hospitals (ITRMC San Fernando City, La Union, R1MC-Dagupan City, Pangasinan, MMH, and MC-Batac City, Ilocos Norte). All DOH representatives closely monitored the situation and coordinated with their respective MDRRMCs

#### **DOH II**

- Activated Code White Alert for continuous monitoring and coordination with the key health personnel's and other stakeholders, and prepositioned drugs, medicines first aid kits, and family kits in the following provinces: Cagayan (PhP122,728.92); Isabelala (PhP141,977.00); Batanes (PhP76,544.45); Quirino (PhP76,710.67); Nueva Vizcaya (PhP97,814.62)

#### **CHD-HEMS IV-B**

- Coordinated with all CHD Extension Offices, Provincial Health Team Office, and City Health Team Offices and prepositioned assorted drugs and medicines in five provinces of MIMAROPA; CHD Extended Office provided assorted medicines to evacuation centers and those who are affected; monitored health situation on evacuation center and conducted assessment on flooded areas in coordination with Local Government Unit (LGU)



## **PHILIPPINE RED CROSS (PRC)**

- **PRC OpCen** alerted all volunteers including 143 and RCAT teams, placed all Chapters concerned on standby and advised them to report to OpCen-NHQ re their current situation

### **PRC Pangasinan**

- On 24-Hour alert status; placed WASAR Teams on standby for response mobilization; made available first aid kits, spine boards, and other resources and equipment that may be used in the conduct of relief, rescue and rehabilitation operations; alerted Red Cross 143; placed CISD Teams/PRC volunteers on standby for response augmentation; and stockpiled food packs

### **PRC Ilocos Sur and Ilocos Norte**

- Prepared first aid kits and spine boards and alerted first aiders and trained volunteers

## **PHILIPPINE INFORMATION AGENCY (PIA)**

### **PIA I**

- Disseminated public weather bulletins/advisories on time through the utilization of PIA news Text Blasting and closely linked with the media and LGUs particularly the Information Officer

### **PIA CAR**

- Assisted the CDRRMC in information dissemination through the use of tri-media and informed the public on the precautionary and preparedness measures

## **NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION (NTC)**

### **NTC I**

- Alerted all accredited Civic Communication Groups in AOR to assist the NTC on communications concern in case the system failures and for emergency communication back-up

## **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS (DPWH)**

### **DPWH I**

- Activated of Operation Centers and District Disaster Action Teams and deployed personnel for clearing operations

### **DPWH IV-B**

- Prepositioned heavy equipment in strategic areas for possible clearing operations and activated DRRM Teams to monitor situational status of national roads and bridges

### **DPWH CAR**

- Activated its Operations Center to continuously monitor road conditions; prepositioned 13 Dump trucks, 6 Pay loaders, 7 Road Graders, Excavator, and a Roller, for possible road clearing operations in roads that are still closed to traffic

## **DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (DA)**

### **DA I**

- Activated its regional command center and closely monitored the possible effect on the agricultural sector

#### **DA CAR**

- Coordinated with OCD-CAR about crops situationer and initial assessment report

#### **ARMED FORCES OF THE PHILIPPINES (AFP)**

##### **NFNL**

- Placed on standby the "OPLAN SARANAY" a tool in mobilizing AFP resources during disaster response and the resources / equipment for, search, rescue, retrieval operations, and relief operations

##### **501<sup>st</sup> and 503<sup>rd</sup> BDE**

- Placed on standby 3 Rubber Boats, 3 Ambulances, 10 M35 trucks, and 12 KM 450 trucks

##### **PMA DRTG**

- Placed on standby, 3 M35, 2 ambulances, and 13 buses

##### **SOLCOM**

- SOLCOM Commander advised all operating units to coordinate with the LDRRMCs in their respective AORs and be prepared to assist in the operations

##### **TOG 1**

- Prepositioned 1 M35 truck, 3 elf trucks, and 1 KM450 truck

##### **21IB, 5ID**

- Deployed 3 trucks and 24 personnel for the hauling of relief goods from DSWD warehouse intended for the Province of Batanes

##### **76<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion**

- Deployed platoon / squad with assets and provided transportation and security during the evacuation of the affected families in Sablayan, Abra de Ilog and Mamburao, Occidental Mindoro

#### **PHILIPPINE COAST GUARD (PCG)**

- PCG Units was placed on heightened alert to be able to respond to any emergency situation in areas affected by Typhoon "Odette"

##### **CGDNL**

- Activated all its District Operations Center; alerted all WASAR Teams equipped with rubber boats with OBM for response; and Implemented the prevention of fisher folks and other small sea vessel from venturing out into the sea due to the threat of big waves

##### **CGD North Eastern Luzon**

- Manned its command centers 24/7 to closely monitor maritime incidents; continuously disseminated weather bulletin and coordinated with all detachments, fisher folks, and barangay captains along coastal areas within AOR; directed Coast Guard stations/sub-stations to coordinate with coastal barangays and ship master/owners regarding movement of vessel during heavy weather; advised all small motor banca/fishing banca not to venture out into the sea; and placed on standby alert the PCG INMARSAT Communication System and Deployable Response Group (DRG) ready for deployment as the need arises

##### **CGD Palawan/Southern Tagalog**

- Disseminated weather bulletin and gale warning to their respective stations and detachments

## **PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE (PNP)**

### **PNP PRO I**

- On standby all police stations; assessed the disaster preparedness plan; and conducted inventory of resources and equipment that may be used in the relief, rescue, and rehabilitation operations

### **PNP PRO IV-A**

- Advised all provincial Police Offices, City/ Municipal Police Stations to monitor the weather situation and to assist the LDRRMCs in the conduct of evacuation and SAR operations as the need arises

### **PNP PRO CAR**

- On standby ready for the activation of OPLAN SAKLOLO, alerted all Provincial Police Offices (PPO) for the possible effects of TS Odette; with 1 ambulance, 4 rubber boats, and 3 troop carrier trucks as standby equipment for response; prepositioned 130 units of PNP search and rescue box in all high risk municipalities in the region; and responded to the areas with reported incidents

## **BUREAU OF FIRE PROTECTION (BFP)**

### **BFP IV-A**

- Alerted all provincial, city, and municipal fire stations to assist the LDRRMCs in the conduct of evacuation and SAR operations if situation warrants

### **BFP CAR**

- On alert status with 5 rubber boats, 7 ambulances, 43 fire trucks, 10 M35 trucks, and 12 KM450 trucks as standby assets for possible impact of Typhoon "Odette"

## **2. REGIONAL**

### **RDRRMC I**

#### **RDRRMC/OCD I Operations Center**

- Upgraded from WHITE to BLUE ALERT; continuous dissemination of weather updates/bulletins to all RDRRMC members/agencies, LDRRMCs and local media and uploaded same to OCD-RDRRMC Facebook page to effectively ensure public safety and achieve zero-casualty; advised RDRRMC member agencies and PDRRMCs to continuously monitor the weather situation and advised local DRRMCs especially at the low-lying areas to report any untoward incident, and conduct rescue, relief, and other response operations when necessary

#### **PDRRMCs Pangasinan, La Union, and Ilocos Sur**

- Activated all CDRRMCs/MDRRMCs, and BDRRMCs; disseminated warning information to low-lying communities and local radio stations; and prepositioned equipment and relief goods in their AOR

#### **PDRRMC Ilocos Norte**

- Activated its Operation Center on 20 September 2013, advised local officials and their respective City/Municipal DRRMCs to prepare equipment and relief goods; conducted pre-emptive evacuation at Brgy. Parada, Dingras in coordination with AFP and PNP and evacuated families to the Barangay Hall and provided with relief goods; provided 2,000 sand bags and dispatched 1 dump truck to Brgys. Puttao and Bubuos Solsona for the conduct of

sandbagging operations at the breached dike. The Chairperson of PDRRMC Ilocos Norte convened the council in the afternoon of 22 September 2013 and declared the entire province under a State of Calamity

#### **CDRRMC Laoag City**
