I. SITUATION OVERVIEW

11 September 2017

At 4:00 PM, the Typhoon, with International Name TALIM, located East of Northern Luzon has entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) and was named "LANNIE". It has the maximum sustained winds of up to 120 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 145 kph. "LANNIE" has no direct effect to the country.

Meanwhile, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) East of Southern Luzon has developed into a Tropical Depression (TD) and was given the local name "MARING". It has the maximum winds of up to 45 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 60 kph. "MARING" is forecasted to move West Northwest at 13 kph.

Due to "MARING", Tropical Cyclone Warning Signal (TCWS) No. 1 was raised to Metro Manila, Catanduanes, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, Northern Quezon including Polillo Island, Rizal, Bulacan, Pampanga, Aurora, Quirino, Nueva Ecija, Tarlac, Zambales, Bataan, and Pangasinan.

At 11:00 PM, TD "MARING" was estimated at 190 km East of Infanta, Quezon.

12 September 2017

At 5:00 AM, the TD "MARING" has slightly intensified as it continues to move towards Quezon-Aurora area.

TCWS No. 01 is raised over the Metro Manila, Catanduanes, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, Nothern Quezon incl. Polillo Island, Rizal, Bulacan, Pampanga, Quirino, Nueva Ecija, Nueva Vizcaya, Benguet, La Union, Tarlac, Zambales, Bataan, Pangasinan, Laguna, Quirino, and Aurora

At 5:00 PM, TD "MARING" was located within the vicinity of Pampanga and about to leave the landmass of Luzon.

It is expected to leave Luzon landmass tonight and exit PAR tomorrow evening or Thursday early morning. Tropical Cyclone Warning Signal over Camarines Norte is now lifted. While TCWS No. 01 remains over Metro Manila, Cavite, Laguna,

Batangas, Rizal, Northern Quezon incl. Polillo island, Southern Aurora, Bulacan, Pampanga, Nueva Ecija, Tarlac, Zambales, Bataan and Pangasinan.

B. Casualties

DEAD

- A total of <u>three (3) were reported dead</u> due to landslide and collapsed rip-rap. Two (2) in Taytay, Rizal and one (1) in Lucena, Quezon:
 - a. Justine Pondal, Male, 14 years old (Taytay, Rizal)
 - b. Jude Pondal, Male, 17 years old (Taytay, Rizal)
 - c. Two-month old baby (Lucena, Quezon)

MISSING

 A total of thirteen (13) persons were reported missing in Brgy. Sto. Cristobal, Calamba City, Laguna due to flooding. (Houses located near the riverbanks were swept away by flood. Of which, 8 were rescued by QRT of Brgy. Parlan, Calamba City, Laguna.

C. Suspension of Classes (TAB A) and Work

- Classes in 46 cities and 245 municipalities in Regions III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, and NCR are suspended for today, 12 September 2017.
- Work in government offices in Regions III, CALABARZON, and NCR are suspended today, 12 September 2017.

D. Incidents Monitored

A total of ten (10) incidents were reported in CALABARZON and MIMAROPA:

1. FLOODING (6)

CALABARZON - 5

- a. As of 6:00 AM, 12 September 2017, a flooding incidents occurred in Brgy. Magdalo, Kawit, Brgy. San Jose 1 & 2, Noveleta Brgy. Bagbag, Rosario and Brgy. Logtong, Rosario in the province of Cavite. No evacuees were reported.
- b. As of 6:00 AM, 12 September 2017, a flooding incidents occurred in Municipalities of Famy, Magdalena, Nagcarlan, Bay and Calauan in the province of Laguna. No evacuees were reported.
- c. As of 8:15 AM, 12 September 2017, DLTB Bus with Plate No. VBY 365 Legazpi City bound was stranded in Brgy. Biga, Pitogo due to shoulder deep flood. Rescue units from 85IB were dispatched to rescue the passengers. Locals from the said barangay also helped the 22 passengers transfer to Brgy. Biga Hall, Pitogo. Punong Barangay Fidel Malapit are taking charge of the rescued passengers.
- d. Mayor Eduardo Severo of Calabanga, Camarines Sur was rescued by residents of Brgy. Biga and was brought to Brgy. Hall of Biga, Pitogo.
- e. Houses located near the riverbanks in Brgy. Sto. Cristobal, Calamba City, Laguna were swept away by flood on 11:00 PM, 11 September 2017. A total of thirteen (13) persons were reported missing. Of which, 8 were rescued by QRT of Brgy. Parlan, Calamba City, Laguna. Search and rescue of Calamba CDRRMO still ongoing for the remaining missing persons.

MIMAROPA - 1

a. On or about 6AM of September 12, 2017, river in Brgy. Ballis, Sta Cruz, Marinduque overflowed due to continuous heavy rains causing spillway not passable to all types of vehicles. MDRRMO Sta Cruz, Marinduque continuous monitoring of status of water level.

2. LANDSLIDE (3)

CALABARZON - 3

- a. As of 2:00 AM, 12 September 2017, a landslide incident occurred in Brgy. Wawa, Nasugbu, Batangas. Conducted clearing operations.
- b. As of 8:00 AM, 11 September 2017, A boulder fell from the side of the mountain, due to the continuous rains experienced in Quezon Province. The boulder was removed immediately by the Municipal Engineer Office and MDRRMO placed warning signs and cordoned the area to warn motorists. No casualty reported.
- c. On 4:00 AM, 12 September 2017, one (1) house collapsed in Hapay na Mangga, Brgy. Dolores, Taytay, Rizal due to landslide. Two (2) persons were reported dead. Forced evacuation were enforced by the MDRRMO after the incident though last night they were advised to evacuate. The MDRRMO rescued the other members of the family.

3. COLLAPSED RIPRAP (1)

CALABARZON - 1

a. A rip-rap along the river collapsed causing the death of a two-month old baby in Lucena, Quezon. CDRRMO Lucena responded to the incident and brought the survivors to Mt. Carmel Hospital.

E. Damaged Houses

1. A total of six (6) houses were partially damaged while three (3) houses were totally damaged in Silang, Cavite.

III. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

A. National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council

1. NDRRM Operations Center (NDRRMOC)

- a. Conducted Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) re Typhoon TALIM (International Name) and LPA on 11 September 2017, 10:00 AM.
- b. Issued NDRRMC Memorandum to RDRRMCs I, II, III, CALABARZON, V, CAR, and NCR re Submission of RDRRMC's Preparedness Actions in relation to Typhoon "TALIM".
- c. Issued NDRRMC Memorandum to NDRRMC Member-Agencies re the Alert Status at the NDRRMOC.
- d. Conducted a press briefing at around 12NN, 12 September 2017 at the OCD.
- e. Prepared the following Emergency Alert and Warning Message (EAWM) and forwarded the same to Telecommunications Service Providers for widest dissemination to the public:

3. Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG)

- a. Provided information/advisories to all concerned DILG ROs regarding the development of the TC TALIM and LPA thru emails and text blasts.
- Instructed all concerned DILG ROs to take proactive measures in the impending disaster.
- c. Issued an Advisory to all concerned Regions on the TC TALIM and Low Pressure Area on 10 September 2017.
- d. Provided constant updates on weather alerts/advisories to all ROs.
- e. Advised all Regions concerned for the TC TALIM and LPA and directed to advised all LGUs concerned on the following:
 - Monitor all PAGASA weather advisories and typhoon bulletins as well as the Project NOAH via website
 - ii. Established critical preparedness actions based on the Operation L!STO protocols, and prioritize prepositioning of supplies and equipment for response
 - iii. Visit the MGB Geo-Hazard Web Portal at gdis.denr.gov.ph/mgbgoogle for additional information.
 - iv. Continue to monitor all PAGASA weather advisories and typhoon bulletins via http://www.pagasa.dost.gov.ph/, as well as the Project www.noah.dost.gov.ph;
 - v. Observe existing protocols, including Proof of Service.
 - vi. CODIX coordinates with PAGASA and MGB in monitoring for updates
 - vii. Continuous monitoring of all affected LGUs

4. Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)

b. The Disaster Response Operations Monitoring and Information Center (DROMIC) of the DSWD-DReAMB is on 24/7 duty for monitoring of disaster events and report updates.

5. Department of Health (DOH)

- a. Issued alert memorandum to all regional offices to actively monitor weather disturbance, activation of Code Alert and 24/7 OpCen, Prepositioning of human resources and stockpiling of medicines and medical supplies.
- b. A total of P20,691,324.46 amount of logistics was prepositioned by Regions II, III, IV-A, and V. Moreover, a total of PP57,469,354.76 amount of logistics is present at the DOH Central Office.

6. Mines and Geosciences Bureau (DENR-MGB)

 a. Provided the list of barangays susceptible to flooding and rain-induced landslides on 11 September 2017.

7. Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP)

a. Advised unified command to keep track of the said weather disturbance and monitor all flood and landslide prone areas on a possible conduct of preemptive evacuation, proactive measures and HADR preparation and deployment in coordination with LGUs and LDRRMCs

8. National Grid Corporation of the Philippines (NGCP)

- a. Power system operator and transmission service provider NGCP has implemented the necessary preparations and precautions to minimize the impact of the weather disturbance on transmission operations and facilities.
- b. Integrated Disaster Action Plan (IDAP) prescribes these and other procedures to ensure the readiness of all power transmission facilities expected to be affected by the passage of the weather disturbance.
- c. NGCP's Regional Disaster Command Center monitors all power restoration activities, reports, and updates from the District Command Centers in Luzon, whichever is directly affected by the weather disturbance.

9. Philippine Coast Guard (PCG)

 All PCG units were advised to ensure strict implementation of HPCG Memorandum Circular Number 02-13 (Guidelines on Movement of Vessels during Heavy Weather). Advised fishermen not to venture out to sea and warned of the adverse weather conditions.

B. Regional / Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (R/LDRRMCs)

RDRRMCs I, II, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, CAR, and NCR conducted PDRA meeting re the said weather disturbance and continuously disseminates weather advisories/bulletins to RDRRMC member-agencies, P/C/MDRRMCs, and local media (radio stations) through OCD InfoBoard Text Blast System, and upload the same to social accounts to effectively ensure public safety and achieve zero-casualty; alerted and closely coordinates with all PDRRMCs and RDRRMC member-agencies for possible rescue, relief, and other response operations relative to the weather disturbance; and continuously monitors the situation in their respective AORs.

1. REGION I

Office of Civil Defense (OCD) I

- a. Issued Memorandum to RDRRMC I member agencies and PDRRMCs re Raising of Alert Status at the RDRRMOC I for the Typhoon "LANNIE".
