I. SITUATION OVERVIEW

15 October 2017

Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) affecting Southern Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao.

16 October 2017

At 10:00 PM, the Tropical Storm with international name "LAN" entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility and was named "PAOLO". It has maximum sustained winds of up to 80 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 95 km/h.

The center of Tropical Storm "PAOLO" was estimated based on all available data at 940 km East of Guiuan, Eastern Samar (11.0°N, 134.3°E). Estimated rainfall amount was from moderate to heavy within the 425 km diameter of the Tropical Storm.

Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) affecting Southern Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao.

17 October 2017

At 11:00 AM, TS "PAOLO" has intensified into a Severe Tropical Storm as it moved over the Philippine Sea. At 10:00 AM, the center of Severe Tropical Storm "PAOLO" was estimated based on all available data at 765 km East of Guiuan, Eastern Samar (11.0°N, 132.7°E).

At 11:00 PM, STS "PAOLO" slightly intensified as it moved over the Philippine Sea. The center of STS "PAOLO" was estimated based on all available data at 675 km East Northeast of Hinatuan, Surigao del Sur (10.5°N, 132.1°E) with maximum sustained winds of up to 105 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 130 kph.

The estimated rainfall amount was from moderate to heavy within the 450 km diameter of the Severe Tropical Storm. The outer rain bands of "PAOLO" brought scattered light to moderate with occasional heavy rains over Bicol Region, Visayas and Mindanao.

Meanwhile, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) was estimated based on all available data at 200km West Northwest of Puerto Princesa City, Palawan (10.9°N, 117.1°E). This weather system brought scattered light to moderate with possible occasional heavy

rains over Palawan embedded along the ITCZ affecting Southern Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao.

18 October 2017

At 10:00 AM today, the eye of Typhoon "PAOLO" was located based on all available data at 735 km East of Guiuan, Eastern Samar (11.8 °N, 132.4 °E). It has maintained its strength and continues to move in a North Northwest direction.

Meanwhile, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) was estimated based on all available data at 280km West of Puerto Princesa City, Palawan (9.7°N, 116.2°E). This weather system brought scattered light to moderate with occasional heavy rains over Palawan.

19 October 2017

At 10:00 PM, the eye of Typhoon "PAOLO" was located based on all available data at 930 km East NorthEast of Baler, Aurora (17.3°N, 130.1°E). It maintained its strength and moved north northwest over the Philippine Sea.

Meanwhile, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) was estimated based on all available data at 235 km North Northwest of Puerto Princesa City, Palawan (11.6°N, 117.8°E). This weather system, along with the outer rainbands of "PAOLO" and the southwesterly windflow enhanced by this Typhoon brought scattered to widespread rains and thunderstorms over Palawan, Bicol Region, Visayas, CARAGA, Northern Mindanao, Zamboanga Peninsula and ARMM.

20 October 2017

At 10:00 AM, TY "PAOLO" has slightly changed course and is now moving in a North Northeast direction with a maximum sustained winds of up to 130 kph and gustiness of up to 160 kph. At 10:00 PM, it maintains its direction and is slowly moving away from the country. Meanwhile, the LPA near Mindoro has already dissipated.

The outer rainbands of TY "PAOLO" and the southwesterly windflow enhanced by this typhoon will bring scattered to widespread rains and thunderstorm over Visayas and the regions of MIMAROPA and Bicol.

21 October 2017

At 10:00 PM, TY "PAOLO" has maintained its strength and is about to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) with a maximum sustained winds of up to 185 kph and gustiness of up to 225 kph. It is forecasted to move North Northeast at 27 kph.

The southwesterly wind flow enhanced by this Typhoon was forecasted to bring cloudy skies with scattered light to moderate and at times heavy rainshowers during thunderstorms over Mindanao, Western Visayas, and Palawan.

22 October 2017

At 4:00 AM, TY "PAOLO" is exited PAR and was located at 1,345 km East Northeast of Basco, Batanes with a maximum sustained winds of 185 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 225 kph.

II. EFFECTS

A. INCIDENTS MONITORED (17)

LANDSLIDE - 3

CARAGA - 1

1. On 16 October 2017, 8:00 PM, heavy rains caused a landslide along_National Highway in P-4, Barangay Bangonay, Jabonga, Agusan del Norte. Three (3) houses

were totally damaged. The area is now cleared of debris as of 6:00 PM, 18 October 2017.

MIMAROPA - 2

1. On 17 October 2017, 7:00 AM, a landslide incident occurred along national road in Brgy, Napsan, Puerto Princesa City, Palawan due to continuous heavy rains. DPWH District Office conducted clearing operations to clear the road of debris. As of 17 October 2017, 10:00 AM, the road is passable to all types of vehicles. No reported casualties/damages.

2. On 17 October 2017, 7:00 AM, a landslide incident occurred along City road in Brgy. Buenavista, Puerto Princesa City, Palawan due to continuous heavy rains. Clearing operations was conducted by City Engineering Office. As of 17 October 2017, 1:00 PM the road is already passable to all types of vehicles. No reported

casualties/damages.

FLOODING/FLASHFLOOD - 9

MIMAROPA - 3

1. On 17 October 2017, 6:00 AM, heavy rains caused 1.8 m flooding in Purok Reynakan and Purok Damayan in Brgy. Maoyon, Puerto Princesa City, Palawan. A total of forty-five (45) individuals were affected 45 and were evacuated to Brgy. Hall of Maoyon.

2. Around 1:00 PM of 20 October 2017, a flooding incident was reported in the intersection of Barangays Cambunang, Campaasan, and Nasukob in Bulalacao, Oriental Mindoro. Flood waters were approximately 0.5 meters deep. There are no reported evacuees as of this time. On 21 October 2017, flood waters already subsided.

3. Around 11:00 AM of 20 October 2017, another flooding incident was reported in Barangay Poblacion, Magsaysay, Occidental Mindoro. Flood waters were approximately 0.2 meters deep. On 21 October 2017, flood waters already subsided.

REGION IX - 3

1. A total of eighteen (18) barangays in Zamboanga City were affected by flashflood brought about by heavy rainfall due to ITCZ.

2. On 16 October 2017, flooding incidents occurred in the Municipalities of Siocon and Liloy in Zamboanga del Norte due to overflowed rivers (Mucas River in Liloy, and Siocon and Pisawak Rivers in Siocon).

3. At around 12:00 AM, 15 October 2017, rivers swelled in municipality of Sibuco in Zamboanga del Norte due to moderate to heavy rainfall. River beds can no longer contain the water resulting to overflow in the direction of nearby houses in Brgys. Malayal, Lintangan, Cusipan, Poblacion, and Puliran.

REGION XII - 1

1. On 18 October 2017, Barangay Kalamongog, Lebak, Sultan Kudarat was flooded due to heavy rains.

CARAGA - 1

1. On 16 October 2017, 8:00 PM, Brgy. Bangonay in Jabonga, Brgy. Poblacion 1 (Agay) in Remedios T. Romualdez, and Brgys. Poblacion 2, Pangaytan, Kasagatan in Santiago all in the Province of Agusan del Norte were flooded after a heavy downpour. All areas are now flood free as of 6:00 PM, 18 October 2017.

ARMM - 1

1. Water level in Simuay River has gradually increased due to continuous rains which caused flooding to low-lying barangays in Sultan Mastura, Maguindanao.

STRONG WINDS / BIG WAVES - 5

REGION IX - 1

1. On 15 October 2017, coastal barangays of Lingayon, Limpapa, Lambaguan, Mantivoh, Anongan, and Cawit-Cawit in Zamboanga City were hit by big waves.

REGION XII - 3

- Big waves brought about by strong winds and heavy rainfall was experienced in three (3) coastal barangays of Kalamansig, Sultan Kudarat on 19 October 2017, around 6:00 AM. As a result, pre-emptive evacuation was conducted on the affected families currently staying at 3 evacuation centers.
- On 18 October 2017, around 6:00 PM, big waves brought about by strong winds and heavy rainfall was experienced in the coastal barangays of Kiamba and Malapatan in Sarangani Province. A total of 87 families / 434 persons were affected and 54 families were evacuated in Barangay Evacuation Centers while some opted to stay with their relatives.
- 3. At around 5:00 PM on 18 October 2017, six (6) coastal barangays in Lebak, Sultan Kudarat were affected by big waves due to strong winds. The incident resulted to damaged houses and evacuation of affected families.

ARMM - 1

 Houses were reported damaged in the municipalities of Tapul, Jolo, Kalingalang Caluang, and Pata, all in the province of Sulu due to strong winds and big waves brought about by ITCZ.

D. STATUS OF LIFELINES

ROADS AND BRIDGES

- 1. Daang Maharlika Road in Sogod, Southern Leyte were reported not passable due to landslide since 18 October 2017.
- 2. Dinganen Bridge in Buldon, Maguindanao was damaged due to flash flood on 18 October 2017, 9:00 AM. To date, a pathway beside the said bridge is being used as an alternate route.

POWER SUPPLY

- 1. As of 19 October 2017, 2:00 AM, the mainland area of the Province of Surigao del Norte (excluding Siargao Island) experienced black out due to the tripping off of electrical lines of NGCP Surigao-Placer service area brought about by strong winds. As of 19 October 2017, 7:05 A.M, NGCP has already restored its power lines. However, the Surigao del Norte Electric Cooperative (SURNECO) has not yet restored its power system due to damaged electric lines/wires. Power has been restored in mainland Surigao del Norte on 9:00 PM, 19 October 2017.
- As of 19 October 2017, Brgy. Talon, Capitulangan, Alagatan, Maribucao, Mimbalagon, and Tinabalan in Gingoog City experienced power interruption due to toppled electric posts. As of 20 October 2017, the whole Gingoog City experienced power interruption.

E. STATUS OF PORTS

SEAPORTS

 A total of 123 passengers were stranded in the Ports of Bulan and Pasacao in Bicol on 21 October 2017 due to rough seas caused by strong to gale force winds associated with TY "PAOLO". Normal port operations resumed on 20 October 2017.

III. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

A. National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council

- a. Provided updates on the track of the said weather disturbance and Status of monitored major dams during the ERP Meeting on 17 October 2017.
- b. Continuously disseminating Severe Weather Bulletins, General Flood Advisories, Flood Bulletins, and Gale Warnings re Typhoon "PAOLO".

3. Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG)

- a. Provided information/advisories to all concerned DILG ROs regarding the development of the TY "PAOLO" thru emails and text blasts.
- b. Instructed all concerned DILG ROs to take proactive measures in the impending disaster.
- c. Provided updates on weather alerts/advisories to all ROs and LGUs.

- d. Alerted and advised all concerned DILG Regional Offices and LGUs concerned on the following:
 - Monitor all PAGASA weather advisories and typhoon bulletins as well as the Project NOAH via website
 - Established critical preparedness actions based on the Operation LISTO protocols, and prioritize prepositioning of supplies and equipment for response

- e. Continue to monitor all PAGASA weather advisories and typhoon bulletins via http://www.pagasa.dost.gov.ph/, as well as the Project NOAH website www.noah.dost.gov.ph/
- f. Coordination with PAGASA and MGB in monitoring for updates.
- g. Continuous monitoring of all affected LGUs.

4. Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)

- a. Prepositioned stockpiles and standby funds amounting to ₱ 1,029,778,311.50.
- DSWD-DReAMB Operations Center is on GREEN alert and place on standby for BLUE Alert Status.
- c. The Disaster Response Operations Monitoring and Information Center (DROMIC) of the DSWD-DReAMB is on standby for monitoring of disaster events and report updates.

- a. Activated all P/C/M Quick Response Teams in five (5) provinces of MIMAROPA to regularly monitor the situations in their areas.
- b. Activated all members of R/P/C/M QRTs together with special projects on a 24/7 basis in case there is any untoward incident report happened due to weather disturbance.
- c. Advised our P/MQRTs to coordinate with concerned LGUs to report any unusual eventualities in their respective areas.
- d. In close coordination with the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) for any warning signal updates for monitoring purposes and response mechanism for areas that will be affected.
- e. With available stockpile of 34,424 family food packs to all SWADT and Regional Warehouses including prepositioned goods in identified GIDA/critical areas.

Department of Health (DOH) MIMAROPA

- a. Prepositioned water disinfectant and collapsible Jerry Cans in flood-prone areas of MIMAROPA and Provincial Department of Health Offfice (PDOHO).
- b. Advised Quad-Cluster Teams (Health, NIE, MHPSS, WASH) to be on standby for deployment and augmentation of services.
- c. Advised Human Resource Management for Health to be available on their catchment areas to augment health services and establish health assistance desk once evacuation starts.
- d. Continuous coordination and active monitoring with all PDOHO and HEMS Point Persons for any untoward incident.
- e. Continuous coordination with DOH retained hospitals and other attached agencies including entry and exit point.
- f. Continuous coordination with other Regional agencies including, PCG, PPA, RDRRMC, OCD, LGUs, PNP station and other stakeholders.
- g. Advised PDOHO to coordinate with HEMS-PHO for the health emergencies monitored.
- h. Advised PDOHO to coordinate with Ports Authority and advised nearby port health facilities to be on standby for possible health assistance in relation to the surge of passengers with medical assistance needed.
- i. Advised PDOHO to coordinate with Philippine National Police, Provincial and Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction Management Offices and other response groups in relation to the preparedness and response activities of the event/s being monitored.
- j. Advised PDOHO to conduct roving to all areas of concern especially those with potential risk for mass casualty incident and evacuation.

- k. Coordinated with PDOHO's and DOH Retained Hospital in relation to the inventory of all available drugs, medicines and medical supplies including vaccines and transportation assets.
- Coordinated with Human Resource Management for the inventory of RO/PDOHO warm bodies for the period of monitoring.
- m. Coordinated with General Services Unit for the inventory of transportation assets in the Regional Office, Provincial DOH Offices and DOH retained hospitals.
- n. Coordinated with Logistics Management Unit in relation to the availability of essential drugs/medicines and medical supplies.
- Coordinated with all HEMS Coordinators in the Provinces of MIMAROPA and advised to proactively coordinate with RO HERO OpCen for and submit daily situation updates.
- p. Coordinated with Philippine Air force 505 Search and Rescue for the utilization of Air Medical Services in the Provinces of MIMAROPA as contingency for Air Medevac.

- a. Alerted all maintenance crew of the District Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Teams to monitor condition of National Roads and Bridges and other infrastructure facilities.
- b. Placed all equipment on standby status for easier mobilization as situation warrants.

COAST GUARD DISTRICT SOUTHERN TAGALOG

a. Advised all CG stations and substations are to ensure strict implementation of Guidelines on the movement of vessels during heavy weather (HPCG Memo Circular 01-09) and in the absence of weather bulletin in the locality (HPCG Memo Circular 03-01).

- b. Placed all Deployable Response Groups (DRGs) on standby status 24/7.
