"PERLA" INTENSIFIES INTO A TYPHOON WHILE MOVING SLOWLY NORTHWARD.

PERLA intensified into a Typhoon at 8:00 PM today.

 No tropical cyclone wind signal is in effect over any part of the country. However, occasional gusts may occur over Extreme Northern Luzon until early next week due to the prevailing northeasterly surface wind flow.

- "PERLA" is still forecast not to bring significant high-impact weather over Extreme Northern Luzon. However, residents and disaster managers in Extreme Northern Luzon are still advised to continue monitoring for updates.
- Sea travel is risky, especially for small sea vessels, over the seaboards of Northern Luzon due to potentially rough sea conditions associated with the northeasterly surface wind flow.
- "PERLA" is forecast to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) between tomorrow (20 October) evening and Monday (21 October) morning.
- At 10:00 PM today, the center of Tropical Storm "BUALOI" outside the PAR was estimated based on all available data at 3,045 km East of Visayas (10.8°N, 153.6°E) with maximum sustained winds of 65 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 80 km/h. It is moving North slowly and is less likely to enter the PAR.

Location of eye/center:	At 10:00 PM today, the eye of Typhoon "PERLA" was located based on all available data at 580 km East Northeast of Basco, Batanes (22.0°N, 127.3°E).
Strength:	Maximum sustained winds of up to 120 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 150 km/h.
Movement:	Moving North Slowly
Forecast Positions:	 24 Hour (Tomorrow evening): 750 km Northeast of Basco, Batanes (24.2°N, 128.0°E) 48 Hour (Monday evening): 1,285 km Northeast of Basco, Batanes (Outside PAR) (28.2°N, 131.4°E)
NO TROPICAL CYCLONE WIND SIGNAL	
The public and the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council concerned are	

advised to take appropriate actions and watch for the next update to be incorporated in the 4:00 AM Public Weather Forecast and in the next Severe Weather Bulletin to be issued at 11:00 AM tomorrow.

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Let's untiringly aim for zero casualty.
