

The critical tasks of the Task Group, among others, are to identify, screen and assist suspected or confirmed COVID-19 patients, provide necessary treatment, implement preventive measures, implement community quarantine regulations, maintain peace and order, provide emergency relief to affected population, and undertake proper disposal of cadavers.

OCD MIMAROPA

- · Continuous revisions of SITREP Template
- Irregular boat trips due to Enhanced Community Quarantine.
- No response from other partner agencies during phone calls and emails.
- Lack of PPEs for DRRMOs and other response agencies.

DOH MIMAROPA

- Irregular boat trips due to Enhanced Community Quarantine.
- No response from other partner agency during phone calls.

DSWD MIMAROPA

- Remoteness of the island municipalities from their bank accounts
- Unavailability/insufficient funds: The disbursing officers of some LGUs have limited fidelity bonds; some banks requested for the LGU's funds to be withdrawn from the main branches
- Slow-moving payouts due to limited LGU payout teams and revalidation of eligible beneficiaries
- Doubling of payouts due to some SAP-granted beneficiaries also being 4Ps beneficiaries, or some SAP-granted families also having solo parent assistance beneficiaries
- Some SAP beneficiaries were yet to receive their ATM cards due to the ECQ restrictions to travel
- There were some SAP grantees who were caught drinking and gambling. Grants were retrieved from the said beneficiaries
- Some households are not in the list of SAP but are eligible or qualified. They were advised to appeal in their respective barangays and MSWDO for re-assessment

BFP MIMAROPA

 Insufficient supplies and equipment (e.g. PPE Suit, Alcohol, Face Mask (N95), Solutions for Disinfectant, Sprayer, Thermal Gun/Scanner, Face Mask, Face Shield, and Gloves)

PCG STL

Insufficient supplies and equipment

PRO MIMAROPA

- Some locals were not aware of the proper implementation of APOR, execution of 24 hours curfew liquor ban, mandatory wearing of mask and observance of social distancing
- Some families were not included in SAP or Social Amelioration Program
- Inadequate supply of PPEs issued at manning Quarantine Control Point
- No health workers on duty today designated QCP areas
- The absence of health workers during night time
- Alcohol and sanitizers for the front liner s in the QCP are lacking
- Some municipalities did not issue travel pass to their residents who left in their AOR, while QCPs as ordered by their Municipal Mayor, all non-resident s must carry travel pass from their place upon entering the said municipality
- It has been observed by the duty personnel on QCP of Odiongan Municipality that travel pass of personnels form other municipalities were outdated and not properly filled-up by the issuing agency. Also, only the Brgy. Captain had the original signature and the municipal Mayor's signature was scanned only. On this matter, the travel pass is denied. They must carry updated, properly filled-up and with signature of the authority to be able to enter the Municipality of Odiongan
- Members of Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) does not have PPEs for their Safety
- There are lots of ECQ violators despite the efforts of IATF's info dissemination and full implementation
- There are still motorcycle riders who are driving without driver's license and they use their quarantine pass as alternative for their driver's license just to pass the Quarantine Checkpoints. (we still implement the RA 4136)
- The front liners are in need continuous supply of food and snacks especially vitamins than can help to boost immune system.
- Lack of discipline and cooperation of some community/local residents of every barangay despite of the continuous reminder regarding the strict implementation of Enhanced Community Quarantine guidelines.
- Lack of supply/ shortage of alcohol, facemask and gloves (PPEs)
- Lack of PPE's during checkpoint
- Lockdown/Quarantine and Physical distancing protocols are still violated by some uncooperative residents;
- Strict implementation of wearing of face mask especially in the far flung barangays of every municipality;
- Lateral coordination about the arrival and departure of the vessel carrying passengers and cargoes from other ports.

PCG PALAWAN

- Availability of tent/ space for PUI/ PUM/ Deployable Response Group (DRG)
- DRG Teams: PPEs, thermal scanner, disinfectants, laptops & printers, megaphone, vitamins, communication
- Billeting space, messing, snacks
- Floating assets
- Evaluation/ Assessment of personnel for possible contamination
- Portalets for DRGs
- Portable showers for DRG teams

DTI MIMAROPA

- According to the firms monitored, it is estimated that supplies of the basic and prime commodities will only last for a week because they are having problems with delivery of goods. There are several reasons for the delayed delivery of these goods, to wit:
- No driver willing to drive the delivery trucks to pick up the goods from Lucena and back to Marinduque due to COVID19 scare;

- Delivery trucks coming from suppliers (Manila and other parts of Luzon) are being blocked in the various checkpoints due to various requirements asked from the drivers of these trucks
- Some delivery truck owners prefer not to ply their usual routes and just ride out the Luzon Enhanced Community Quarantine.

DICT LUZON CLUSTER

- Absence of passenger ships and airplane hinders mobility of critical personnel assigned to provinces as work station. Gadgets can't be transported in the absence of courier services.
- Procurement and delivery of emergency communication equipment cannot be completed due to lockdown and quarantine observed by suppliers and ordered still at custom containers.
- Hampered mobilization of partner service providers for the installation and restoration of free wi-fi priority sites.

REGION V

DSWD 5

18 April 2020- List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- Pending releases of LGUs for SAP Non CCT
- Pending payout (awaiting for LBP Batasan memo to LBP branches) for over the counter payment for pantawid families with LBP account but no cash card for SAP CCT.

DA 5

16 April 2020

- LGU advised the operational time of KADIWA that should be in accordance to the local implementing rule; hence, DA KADIWA adhered, e.g., DA Regional Office KADIWA in Pili, CS is open until 1PM only since market hours for LGU Pili in only until 1PM; follow rules on physical distancing and wearing of masks
- Issues on lowland vegetable seed distribution were addressed already especially on the movement/delivery of vegetable seeds; increase in the interest to plant vegetables at backyard level

DILG Region 5

19 April 2020- List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- Virac, Catanduanes- Payout is being done in the plaza.
- Considering the number of barangays and beneficiaries being catered, the house to house would not be that efficient. House to house would entail manpower and time in the distribution. Not mentioning the safety of the LGU/NGA personnel involved in the payout monitoring due to the large amount of money in their safe keeping during house to house payout. There are also security threat reports being considered by the LGU.

16 April 2020 - List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- <u>Ligao City</u>, <u>Albay</u> Large barangays with big numbers of beneficiaries are yet to complete the payout
- <u>Uson, Masbate</u> Some families have filled up the SAC even though they are not qualified. SAC forms coming from the barangays were returned by the MSWDO to the barangays concerned for reason that it has no supporting documents
- <u>Virac, Catanduaners</u> In barangay Salvacion, the wife of a sangguniang barangay member did not declare the name of her husband in the SAC Form; and received 5000 social amelioration. There were 3 other individuals who received the same but were found out not to be qualified
- <u>Baao</u>, <u>Camarines Sur</u> Due to insurgency problems in the mountain area, identified SAC beneficiaries of Sta. Isabel, Baao, CS received their emergency cash assistance at the Municipal Covered Court of Baao. This solution was adopted to protect and ensure the safety of the implementers and recipients of SAP during the payout.
- Sta. Magdalena, Sorsogon
 - Incorrect entry in SAC, were returned to concerned barangay;

- Erroneous entry were requested for SAC replacement causing delay in submission to MSWDO;
- o Clarification on the exclusion of appointed barangay officials belonging to low-income families:
- o sightings of unidentified armed group has been observed in the area which could hamper payout in some interior barangays;
- re-validation and return of SAC to barangays due to series of amended guidelines issued by DSWD

15 April 2020 - List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- <u>Oas, Albay</u> Barangay elective and appointive officials with low income families are requesting and appealing for inclusion in the SAP beneficiaries
- Ragay, Camarines Sur (1) Out of the 10,017 target beneficiaries, only 6,861 families were funded by the DSWD SAP; (2) Payout is scheduled on April 15-18, 2020
- <u>Canaman, Camarines Sur</u> Upon validation of MSWDO, duplication of beneficiaries were noted, hence, contributing to the slow process of payout. Barangays are advised to exclude beneficiaries which may cause duplication for ease on the part of the MSWDO in the validation process. SAP payout to Barangays Palo and San Juan.
- <u>Cabusao, Camarines Sur</u> The MSWDO is continoustly receiving complaints from poor families who were not included in the list. Brgy. appointed officials (e.g. tanod, lupon etc) were also appealing to be included in the list of beneficiaries.
- <u>Bula, Camarines Sur</u> request of appointed/elected Barangay officials to include them as qualified beneficiaries
- <u>Viga, Catanduanes</u> social pensioners who mostly were poor are disqualified from SAP, on-going validation
- <u>Sta. Magadelana, Srosogon</u> Barangay officials are appealing for the inclusion of their appointed officials for inclusion in the SAP; another issued guidelines of DSWD which necessitates again updating of listahanan beneficiaries, which prompted the MSWDO to suspend distribution of SAF to target beneficiaries

14 April 2020 - List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- <u>Basud, Cam Norte</u> Inconsistent guidelines, requirements and matrices issued almost daily & downloaded to LGUs that created confusion causing delay in the finalization of data from the barangay thus prolonging final distribution process
- <u>Aroroy, Masbate</u> Delayed in retrieval of SAC forms left in Barangays Macabug and Cabasan due to the recent armed conflict between the Philippine Army and CTGs; mode of payment of social assistance might be altered in these areas
- <u>Aroroy, Masbate</u> Exclusion of appointed barangay personnel whose honorarium are very minimal - i.e. P600 per month for Barangay Tanod in one of the urban barangays while in other barangays as low as P400; appealing if they can be included

13 April 2020 - List of Issues and Concerns on the Social Amelioration Program

- Barangays can only withdraw an amount that corresponds to their bond, thus they cannot withdraw the entire sum of the ESP and they will have to go back to the banks several times.
- <u>Baao, Camarines Sur</u> MSWD staff extending technical assistance to barangays to fast track the accomplishment of SAC forms, however, insurgency in the mountain area caused apprehension on the part of the implementers.
- Daraga, Albay- Fund not yet downloaded to DBP account of LGU
- <u>Jovellar, Albay</u>- There was duplication on the received benefits (Registered Farmers of DA and Pantawid beneficiaries of DSWD). Both benefits are directly downloaded to the account of concerned beneficiaries; According to MAO, DA just informed him that funds are already downloaded, and refer to their existing database of registered farmers. On going validation of target beneficiaries. [Remarks: 43% are Pantawid Families; 50% are farmers included in DA database)
- <u>Basud, Camarines Norte</u> is not one of the lucky LGUs to get a grant from DA in the form of SAP Assistance or 5K subsidy to poor farmers. Based from the DA Regional Office List of beneficiaries, the province of Camarines Norte where Basud is a component municipality is not

among the provinces under the Rice Competitive Enhancement Fund (RCEF) Program, hence it is not covered by the grant/subsidy.

- <u>Jose Panganiban, Camarines Norte</u>- Undue distribution of SAC Application forms to non-qualified families. Jose Panganiban, Camarines Norte
- <u>Sta. Elena, Camarines Norte</u> A total of 568 beneficiaries submitted today. A total of 5,410 beneficiaries was approved out of the indicative 5,553 given by the DSWD FO V. The approved 5410 is not enough to accommodate all the low-income families affected by the ECQ, hence the request for additional slots.
- <u>Talisay</u>, <u>Camarines Norte</u> not ncluded in the DA program. The Municipal Agriculture Office verified with the Central Office the non-inclusion of the LGU in the DA program.
- <u>Gainza, Camarines Sur-</u> The inclusion in the SAP of DSWD of the farmer-beneficiaries of DA's FSRF (with farm sizes of 1 ha & below and registered under RSBSA) who belong to low-income families per IATF No. 19 dated April 3, 2020, and for the TOP-UP to recipients of TUPAD by DOLE, the SAC Forms downloaded to the LGU will not cater to the actual number of concerned farmers and TUPAD beneficiaries.
- <u>San Fernando</u>, <u>Camarines Sur</u>- According to OIC MSWDO, there was a late instruction that those who are listed in the Listahanan be included in the payout. Thus, there was confusion since the list was already finalized and ready for the payout. The final decision was to push through with the payout and consider the beneficiaries of Listahanan for next tranche.
- <u>Baras, Catanduanes</u>- Queries for DSWD: 1. The family head is already a TUPAD beneficiary, is his son who is a PWD qualified to SAM? 2. How about if a PWD happens to be a barangay official? or a barangay official with a family member who is PWD or a government employee with PWD family member/s. Are they qualified recipients of SAM? The issues have been raised to DWSD but remain unclarified. Response to these needed ASAP for this LGU to complete the number if beneficiaries allotted to them.

PDRRMC Albay

- The untimely announcement of names of COVID-19 Causes the delay of the contact tracing that may pave way to sudden increase of preventable transmission of the disease.
- Disobedience of many individuals to stay-at-home and physical distancing protocols.
- Unexpected arrivals of many individuals to Albay Province using private vehicles and cargo/delivery van from Metro Manila who maybe suspect virus carrier and that resulted to community commotions in their destination barangays.
- Insufficiency of qualified quarantine facilities at the community levels in the event a surge of probable or confirmed cases crop up.
- Conflicting procedures execution of border closure had affected the flow of the essential commodities.
- Anticipation prolonged lockdown and border closures will seriously affect the local economy and may cause hunger and possible increase in crime incident,
- The limited funds of the local government units will not suffice the medical and relief requirements for next for the next few weeks.
- The ambiguous policy in the seaports that had created confusions and misperceptions in handling the transport of essential commodities and the crews between the port of Pioduran and Masbate.

REGION VIII

- Divert the rapid testing allocation to repatriates instead since RT-PCR testing is scheduled simultaneously in the Provinces of Region VIII and (OFW and "Balik Probinsya" returnees)
- PPEs, alcohol, face masks, sanitizers, thermal guns/scanner and other items are no longer available in the region for procurement.
- Most of the frontline response agencies/hospitals lack PPEs which is a recurring concern especially for the responders/health workers who are highly exposed to the COVID-19.

REGION IX

- 1. Conflicting/vague provisions of various issuances (policy on whether the LGUs outside Luzon may declare enhance community quarantine).
- 2. No coordination of 6 passengers who arrived today, April 18, 2020 in Dapitan Port from Dumangas Port, Iloilo who were stranded for 18 days. These passengers were placed onhold for monitoring and clearance.
- 3. Concerns on clear-cut protocols re: passage of travelers towards their point of destination in the region (issues on entry in the different provincial and city/municipal boundaries)
- 4. Barangay officials assisting in the SAP administration has limited knowledge on how to accomplish the forms.

REGION X

Economy

- Preparation of the Recovery and Rehabilitation Plan to address the social and economic impact of COVID-19; and define the "new normal" state of the country/ region.
- Extending the deadline for the environmental regulatory requirements of the DENR and other agencies.
- Management and disposition of toxic wastes
- Price monitoring of rice observed increase in the price of Vietnam rice from PhP1,800/sack to PhP2,000/sack.
- Increasing recorded cases of domestic abuses during the community quarantine period.
- Contents of the food packs of DSWD to contain other food and essential items such as milk for toddlers, diapers, laundry soap, among others.
- Various recommendations from the Economy Task Group members/ stakeholders on the immediate response and post COVID-19 scenario.
- Data generation and analysis of COVID-19 situations at barangay level for planning and policy formulation.

Food and Non-Food Items

- Various discussions regarding the prepositioning of Family Food Packs and the number of items distributed to storage facilities in the Region against the actual capacity of Local Government Units.
- Maintenance of AFP Warehouses where Pest Infestation is also a concern.
- Procurement of Slotted Cartons.
- Department of Trade and Industry
 - Sufficiency of Supply and Compliance to Pricing of Goods.
- National Food Authority
 - Experiencing backlog in its milling activities because Rice Mill workers are affected by lockdowns being implemented in their respective barangays. They cannot report for work
 - Competition in purchasing local palay in July 2020 because of the increased buying price of traders (PhP22.00/kg) and may thus not be able to buy sufficient buffer stock.
 - Lack of labor or trucking from the farmers side during the peak of harvesting.
- Department of Agriculture
 - Shortage of rice
- Philippine National Police
 - Possible ambush by the Communist Terrorist Group
 - CTGs may take advantage to use black propagandas and convince the residents residing at far-flung areas to go against our government if SAP will not be fairly distributed:
 - Possible mobbing-ambush and looting of goods especially in warehouses;

- Lack of Manpower for the immediate distribution of food rations/packs to the beneficiaries;
- After the release of Security Amelioration Program, panic buying will follow;
- Limitations on purchase on groceries and other hygiene products;

Law and Order

- Different directives from agencies (e.g., BFP, PNP) regarding the manning and procedure of the QCPs
- Discussed with the Provincial Governors and Representatives during the RDC-RPOC-RDRRMC-10 Meeting on 6 April 2020 on a common guideline in the issuance of quarantine passes.

Logistics

• Insufficient PPEs, thermal scanners for front liners

Crisis Communication

- Broadcast media prefer that the agency updates during press conferences be presented in Visayan.
- Media practitioners are requesting that their company IDs be honored by those manning the quarantine checkpoints.

REGION XI

- Non-availability of PPEs and disinfectants (alcohol) in the local market within the region.
- Lack of effective information dissemination regarding border control guidelines.
- Delays of agricultural deliveries due to local ECQ implementation
- Insufficient logistic support to farmers in transporting their produce
- Issue on the validity of IAFT IDs issued by several national government agencies to their employees and sectoral employees.
