### Summary of Effects<sup>3</sup>

As of **05 April 2020**, a total of **3,246 confirmed COVID-19 cases** were monitored and reported in the Philippines, of which **152** persons were declared **dead** while **64** persons have already **recovered**.




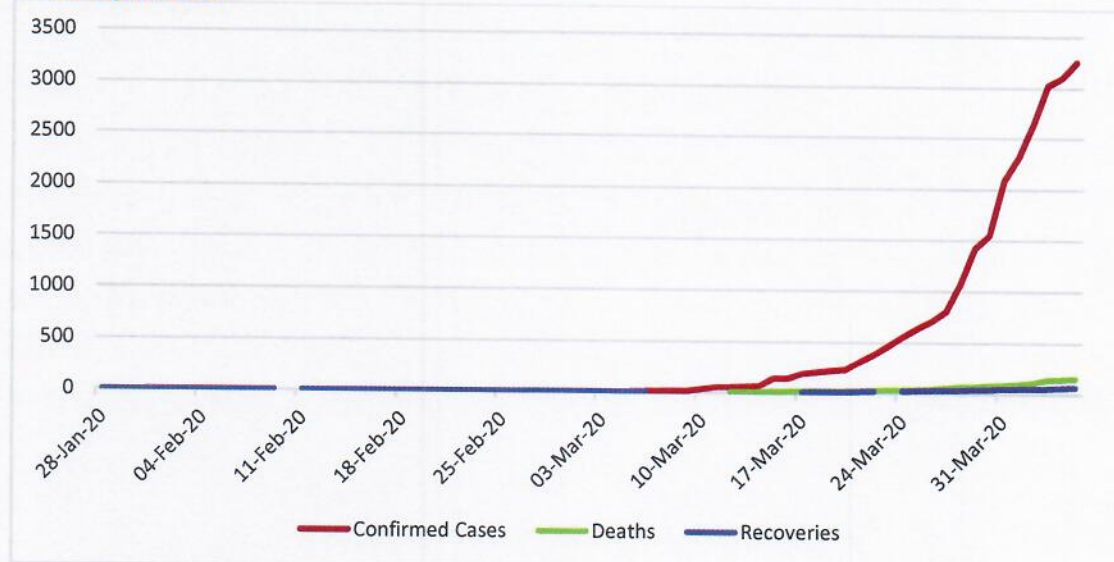

As of **04 April 2020**, a total of **67 provinces**, **113 cities** and **1,336 municipalities** have declared community quarantine.

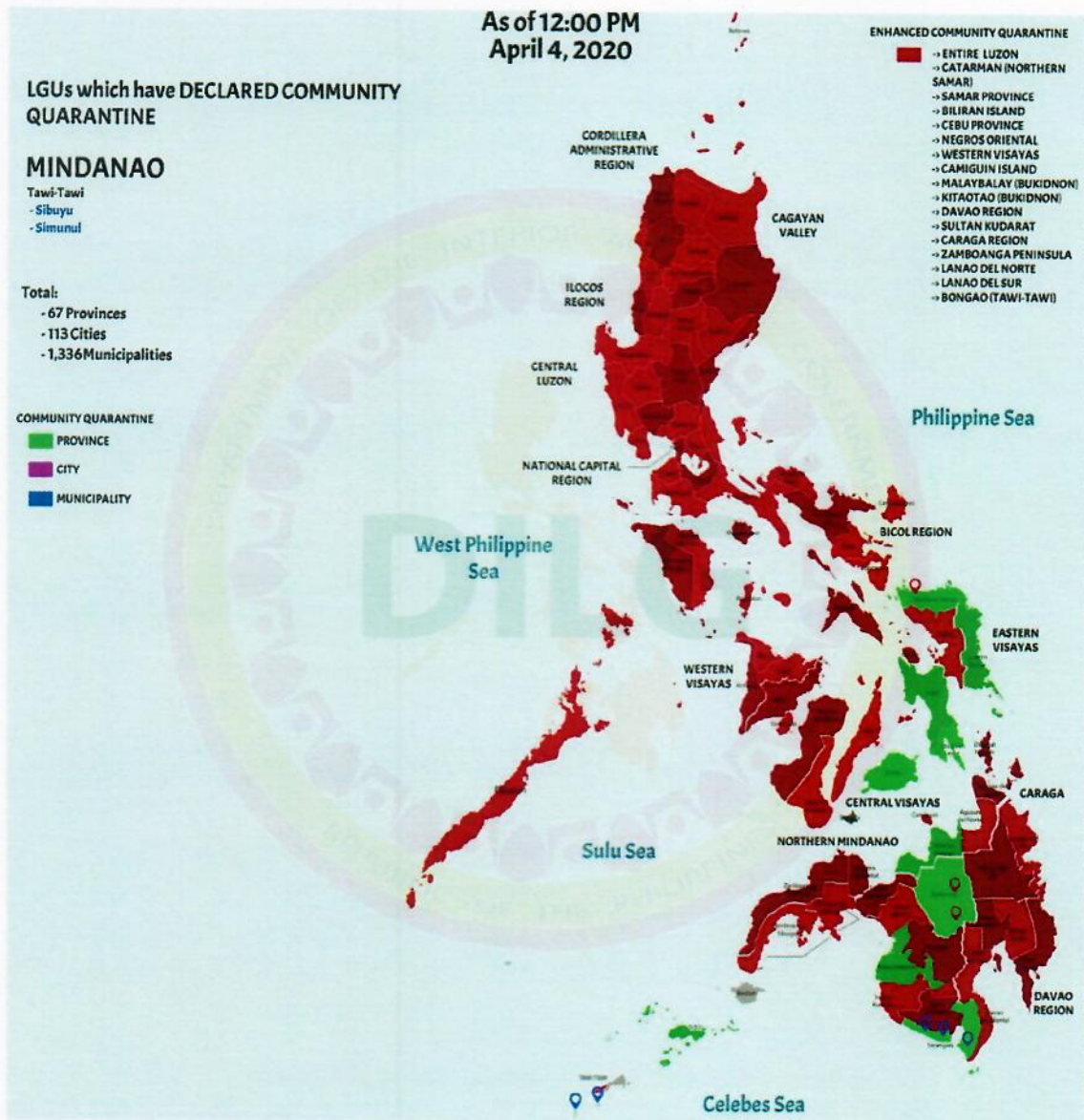


Figure 2 Index map of LGUs with community quarantine declarations

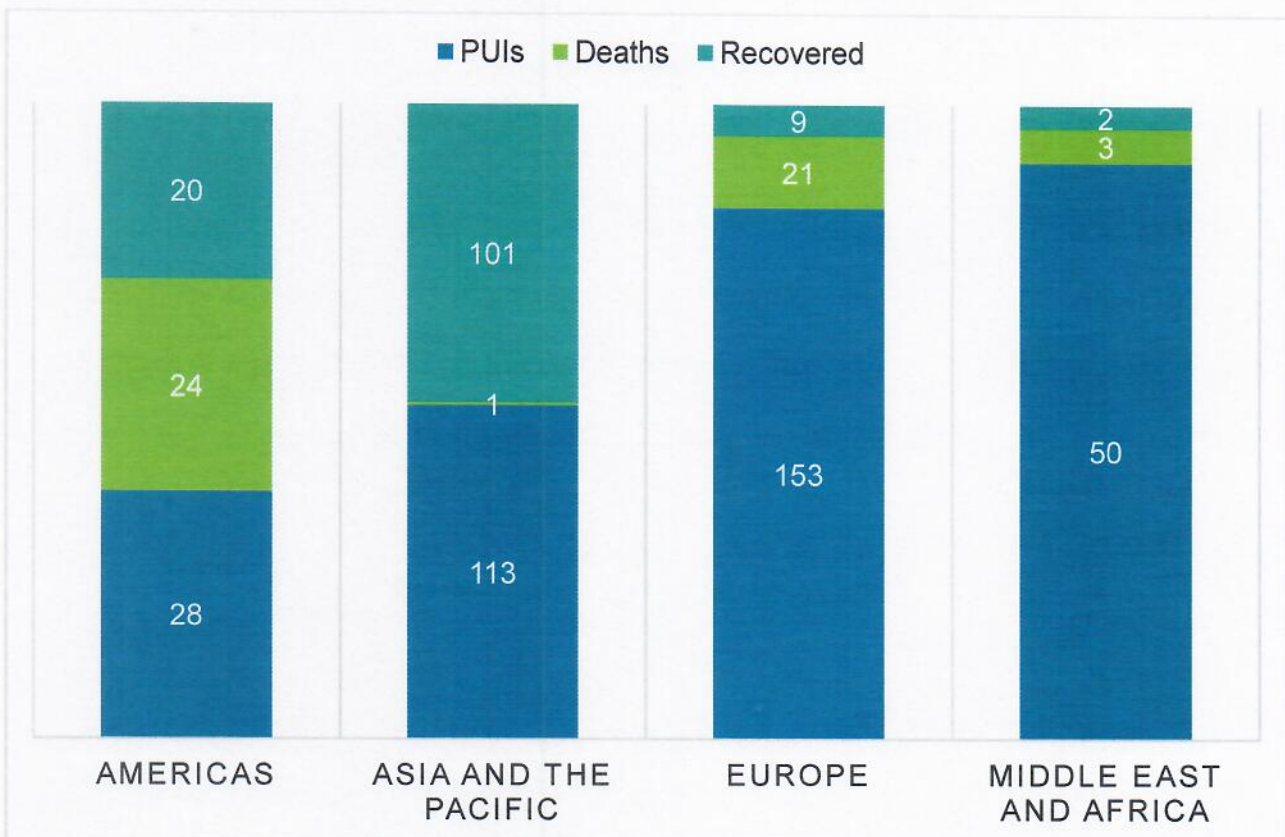

## Summary of Effects to Overseas Filipinos<sup>7</sup>

As of **05 April 2020**, around 33 countries have Overseas Filipinos (OFs) with confirmed COVID-19 cases. A total of **525 confirmed COVID-19 cases** for OFs were monitored and reported, of which **49** were declared **dead** while **132** persons have already **recovered**. Meanwhile, a total of **344** persons are considered as **PUIs**.

The region of **Asia and the Pacific** has the highest number of confirmed COVID-19 cases for overseas Filipinos (**215 cases**) while the region of **Middle East and Africa** has the lowest number of confirmed cases (**55 cases**).

A total of **6,235** OFs have successfully been repatriated.

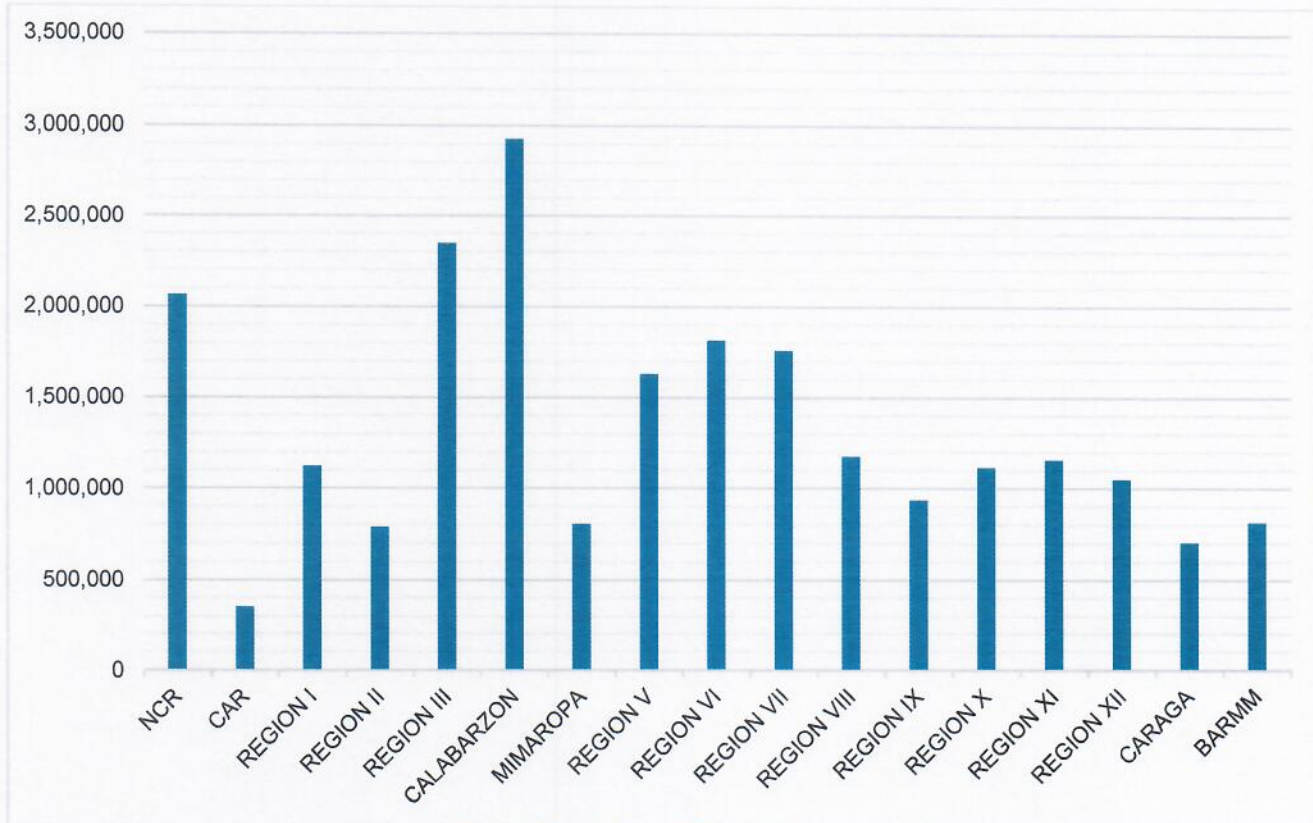

## REPORT ON RESOURCE MANAGEMENT AND LOGISTICS

### Status of Logistical Support Services<sup>9</sup>

The NDRRMC Emergency Operations Center (EOC), managed by the Office of Civil Defense (OCD), facilitated the provision of logistics and transportation support for various items and goods for COVID-19 response:

As of **05 April 2020**, majority of the requests for transportation services are from government entities with a total of 40 requests: 24 or 60% of the total are already completed. Meanwhile, a total of 36 requests are from non-government institutions, 13 or 36% of which are completed. It is also noted that the requests of non-government institutions increased by 138% since **05 April 2020** reporting.

In total, 37 or 49% of the requests are completed while the remaining 39 requests are currently being processed for delivery.

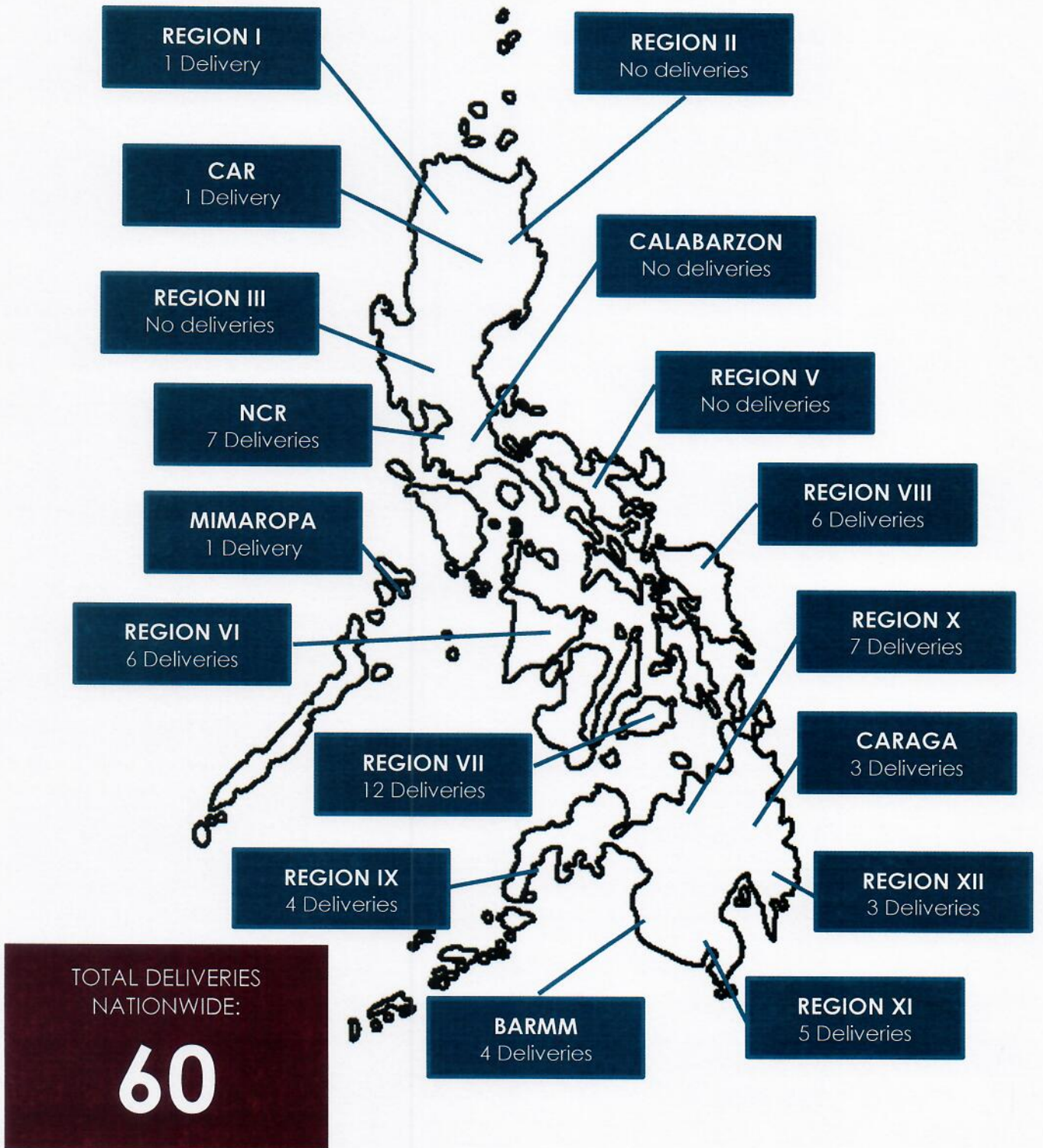


Figure 3 Total logistical support requests delivered per region

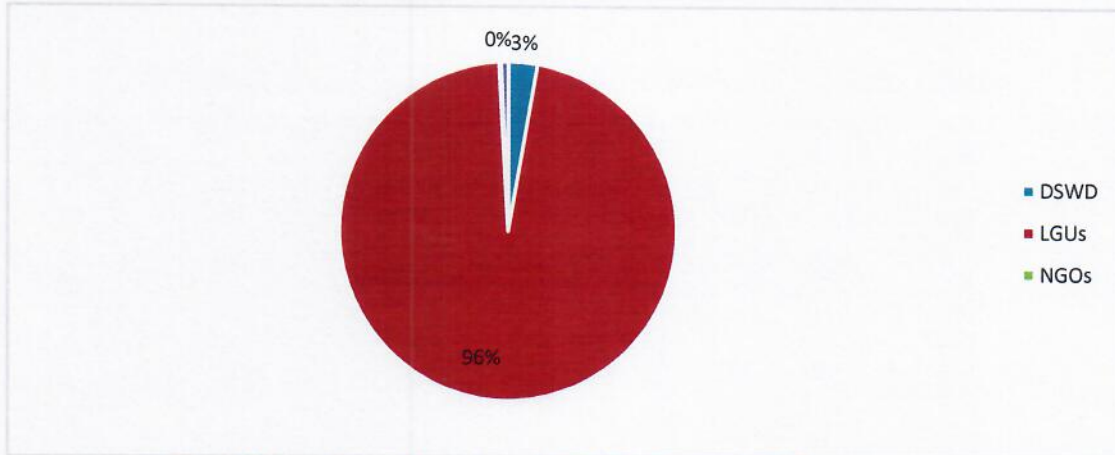

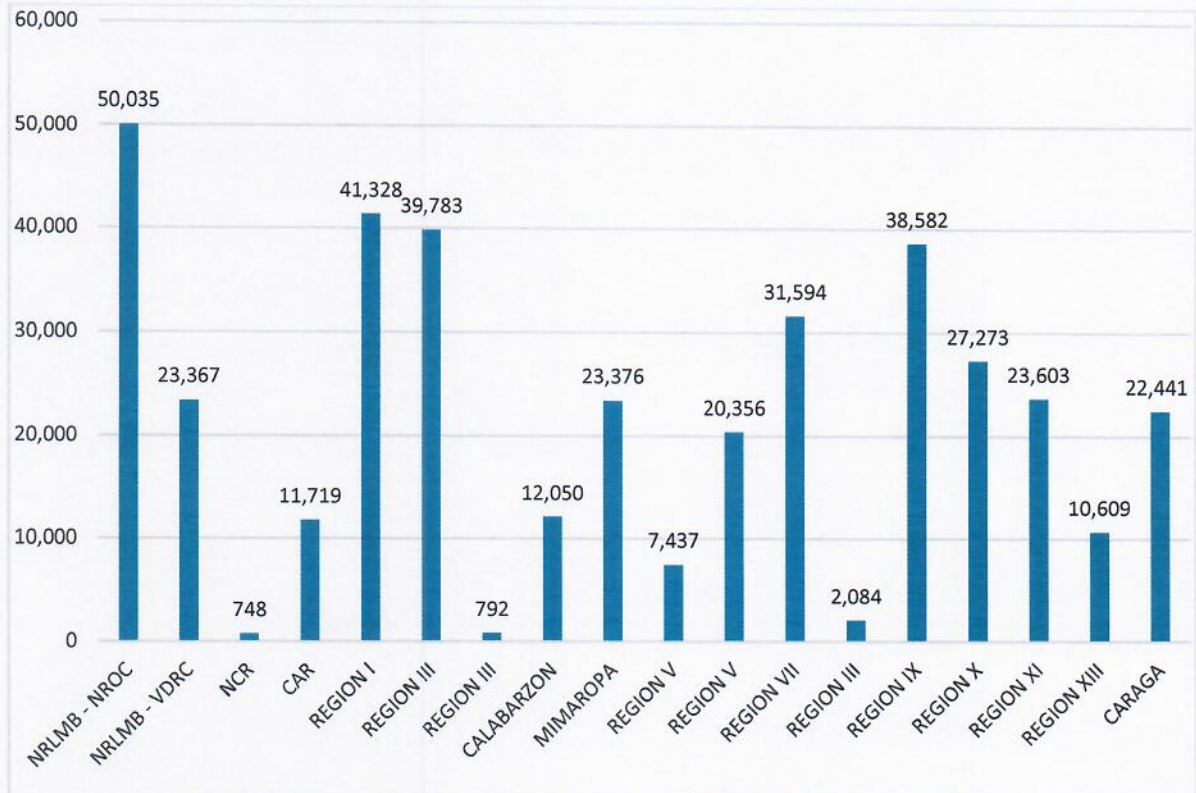

## Status of Standby Family Foodpacks<sup>12</sup>

As of **06 April 2020**, a total of **387,117** family food packs are stockpiled in the DSWD warehouses nationwide. The **highest** number of stockpiling of FFPs is in **NRLMB-NROC** as the main warehouse of DSWD and the **least** number is in **NCR**.



Graph 5 Summary of Stockpiled Family Food packs *Rice Industry Inventory*<sup>13</sup>

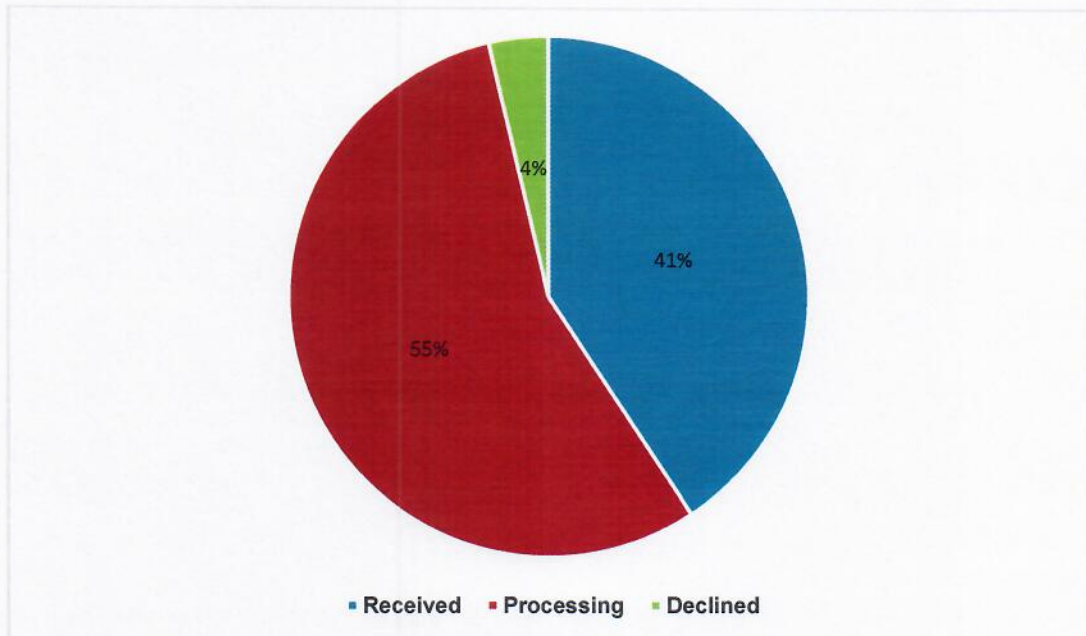

## Offers of International Assistance<sup>14</sup>

As of **05 April 2020**, the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) has processed/assisted in the facilitation of donations from 4 foreign governments, 1 international organization, and 15 private companies and individuals. Most of the assistance provided were testing kits, PPEs and other medical supplies.

Out of the total offers for international assistance, 41% have been received by the Philippines, 55% are currently being processed, with 4% as declined.

## SUMMARY: TASK GROUP RESPONSE OPERATIONS

### Number of Response Personnel Deployed<sup>15</sup>

As part of the Task Group Response Operations, Regional Epidemiology Surveillance Unit (RESU) staff and primary care personnel were deployed to undertake contact tracing. The Philippine National Police (PNP) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) also mobilized the respective personnel. Further, the Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams (BHERTs) were deployed under the instruction of the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG).

### Establishment of Quarantine Control Points<sup>16</sup>

Quarantine control points (QCPs) have been established by the local government units (LGUs) under the supervision of the PNP to implement the procedures for community quarantine. The Joint Task Force Coronavirus (JTF CV) Shield composed PNP, BFP, Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) has also been organized and stationed at the QCPs. Further, QCPs have been established in sea and airports and operated by JTF CV Shield.

### Maintenance of Law and Order<sup>17</sup>

The PNP and other security forces implemented measures to maintain law and order. Persons involved in hoarding, profiteering or manipulation of prices, referred to in this report as market violators, have been arrested. Further, the compliance of operators of public utility vehicles (PUVs) to quarantine procedures was monitored. Actions were taken to arrest, fine or warn violators of curfew rules as well as other individuals who demonstrated disobedient behaviors.

## SUMMARY: TASK GROUP STRATEGIC COMMUNICATIONS<sup>18</sup>

Information, education and communication IEC campaigns and efforts were conducted such social media postings, press briefings and press releases since 04 February 2020 to present

Key messages include the following:

- Support of NDRRMC member agencies to Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF)
- Conduct of meetings to discuss response actions and priorities
- Distribution of donated personal protective equipment (PPEs) and other supplies
- Corrections on false information
