TROPICAL DEPRESSION (TD) "AMBO" MOVES NORTHWESTWARD OVER THE PHILIPPINE SEA EAST OF MINDANAO.

- In the next 24 hours, the trough of TD AMBO will bring scattered light to moderate with isolated heavy rains during thunderstorms over Mindanao. Residents in these areas are advised to continue monitoring for updates, especially the local rainfall or thunderstorm advisories and heavy rainfall warnings of PAGASA Regional Services Division (PRSD).
- Moderate to rough seas will be experienced on the eastern seaboard of Eastern Visayas, Caraga, Davao Oriental, and Davao Occidental. Fisherfolks and those with small seacrafts are advised not venture out on these areas.
- The raising of Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal in any locality of the country remains less likely in the next 48 hours.

Location of eye/center:	At 10:00 PM today, the center of Tropical Depression “AMBO” was estimated based on all available data at 405 km East of Hinatuan, Surigao del Sur (8.4°N, 130.0°E) .
Strength:	Maximum sustained winds of up to 45 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 55 km/h .
Movement:	Moving Northwest at 20 km/h
Forecast Positions:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 24 Hour (Tomorrow evening): 430 km East of Surigao City, Surigao del Norte (10.2°N, 129.4°E)• 48 Hour (Tuesday evening): 350 km East of Borongan City, Eastern Samar (12.0°N, 128.6°E)• 72 Hour (Wednesday evening): 285 km East of Virac, Catanduanes (13.1°N, 126.8°E)• 96 Hour (Thursday evening): 35 km East of Daet, Camarines Norte (14.1°N, 123.3°E)• 120 Hour (Friday evening): 75 km Northwest of Baguio City (16.9°N, 120.1°E)

NO TROPICAL CYCLONE WIND SIGNAL

The public and the disaster risk reduction and management council concerned are advised to take appropriate actions and watch for the next Severe Weather Bulletin to be issued at **11:00 AM tomorrow.**

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Let's untiringly aim for zero casualty.
