"AMBO" SLIGHTLY WEAKENS AND IS NOW APPROACHING REAL – INFANTA AREA IN NORTHERN QUEZON.

Landfall Information:

- Past landfalls: San Policarpo, Eastern Samar (12:15 PM yesterday); Dalupiri Island, Northern Samar (10:15 PM yesterday); Capul Island, Northern Samar (10:30 PM yesterday); Ticao Island, Masbate (12:00 AM today); Burias Island, Masbate (3:00 AM today), San Andres, Quezon (7:45 AM today).
- **Ambo" is forecast to make landfall over Real or Infanta in Northern Quezon between 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM today.**

Heavy Rainfall Outlook:

- **Until Tonight: Moderate to heavy with at times intense rains over Quezon, Marinduque, Aurora, Laguna, Batangas, Rizal, Metro Manila, Bulacan, Pampanga, Nueva Ecija, Isabela, Nueva Vizcaya, and Quirino.**
- **Between tonight until tomorrow (16 May) evening: Moderate to heavy with at times intense rains over Cordillera Administrative Region, Ilocos Region, Central Luzon, Nueva Vizcaya, and Quirino.**
- Residents in these areas are advised to take appropriate measures, coordinate with **Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Offices**, and continue monitoring for updates, especially the local rainfall or thunderstorm advisories and heavy rainfall warnings from PAGASA Regional Services Divisions (PRSD). **Flooding and rain-induced landslides may occur in highly to very highly susceptible areas during heavy or prolonged rainfall.**

Coastal Water Conditions and Storm Surge Information:

- Sea travel is risky for all types of seacrafts over the seaboard of areas under TCWS.

Location of eye/center:	At 4:00 PM today, the center of Severe Tropical Storm "AMBO" was estimated based on all available data including those from Daet Doppler Radar 40 km South of Infanta, Quezon (14.4 °N, 121.7 °E)
Strength:	Maximum sustained winds of 100 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 140 km/h

Movement:	Moving Northwest at 20 km/h.
