**"JULIAN" CONTINUES TO RAPIDLY INTENSIFY WHILE REMAINING ALMOST STATIONARY.**

### Track and intensity outlook:

- "JULIAN" is currently almost stationary over the Philippine Sea. It is forecast to move slowly northward today, then gradually accelerate generally northward tomorrow (30 August) before turning northwestward on Monday (31 August). On the forecast track, the tropical cyclone will remain over the Philippine Sea throughout the forecast period, far from the landmass. It is forecast to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on Monday evening.
- "JULIAN" is undergoing a period of rapid intensification. It is forecast to reach typhoon category this afternoon or evening and may reach peak intensity by Monday.

### Hazards affecting land and coastal waters:

- The raising of Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal is unlikely throughout the forecast period. Furthermore, "JULIAN" is less likely to directly cause high impact weather over the country.
- The Southwest Monsoon is forecast to bring moderate to rough seas (1.2 to 3.4 m) over the seaboard of Northern Luzon and the eastern seaboard of Central Luzon. Those with small seacrafts are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea.

<b>Location of eye/center:</b>	At <b>10:00 AM today</b> , the center of Severe Tropical Storm "JULIAN" at <b>was estimated based on all available data at 850 km East of Tuguegarao City, Cagayan or 800 km East of Casiguran, Aurora (16.4°N, 129.6°E).</b>
<b>Strength:</b>	Maximum sustained winds of <b>100 km/h</b> near the center and gustiness of up to <b>125 km/h.</b>
<b>Movement:</b>	<b>Moving Almost Stationary</b>

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Moreover, you are hereby directed to reiterate the guidelines on personal protection and hygiene such as respiratory etiquette and hand hygiene, social distancing, environmental, and food safety measures.

Let's untiringly aim for zero casualty.
