TYPHOON "JULIAN" INTENSIFIES FURTHER AS IT MOVES NORTHWARD OVER THE PHILIPPINE SEA.

Track and intensity outlook:

- **"JULIAN" is forecast to move generally northward tonight and turn north-northwestward or northwestward tomorrow (31 August). On the forecast track, the tropical cyclone will remain far from the landmass.** It is forecast to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) **tomorrow evening or Tuesday early morning.**
- "JULIAN" is forecast to continuously intensify within the next 24 to 48 hours and may reach peak intensity tomorrow or Tuesday.

Hazards affecting land:

- The raising of Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal is unlikely throughout the forecast period.
- **Tonight through tomorrow afternoon, the Southwest Monsoon and the outer rainbands of "JULIAN" will bring light to moderate with at times heavy rains over Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, Batanes, Babuyan Islands, Cagayan, Isabela, Aurora, Zambales, Bataan, Cavite, Batangas, Occidental Mindoro, and Northern Palawan including Calamian Islands.**
- The public and disaster risk reduction and management offices concerned are advised to monitor the Thunderstorm/Rainfall Advisories and Heavy Rainfall Warnings issued by PAGASA Regional Services Divisions and take appropriate measures. Flash floods and landslides may occur during heavy or prolonged rainfall especially in areas identified to be highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards.

Hazards affecting coastal waters:

- Moderate to rough seas (2.1 to 3.4 m) will be experienced over the seaboard of Northern Luzon and the eastern seaboard of Central Luzon, Southern Luzon, and Visayas due to the Southwest Monsoon and Typhoon "JULIAN". Those with small seacrafts are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea.

Location of eye/center	At 10:00 PM today , the eye of Typhoon "JULIAN" was located based on all available data at 715 km East of Basco, Batanes (19.8 °N, 128.8 °E)
Strength	Maximum sustained winds of 150 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 185 km/h .
Movement	Moving Northward at 20 km/h

In order to better inform/warn communities, you are reminded to disseminate these through local/community leaders and through your local media, including community radio stations. Conduct press briefings as often as needed. This local effort will complement and reinforce efforts at the national level. Emphasis should be on proactive actions – evacuation rather than rescue.

Moreover, you are hereby directed to reiterate the guidelines on personal protection and hygiene such as respiratory etiquette and hand hygiene, social distancing, environmental, and food safety measures.

Let's untiringly aim for zero casualty.
