"JULIAN" INTENSIFIES INTO A TYPHOON.

Track and intensity outlook:

- **"JULIAN" will gradually accelerate generally northward today and turn northwestward tomorrow (31 August).** On the forecast track, the tropical cyclone will remain over the Philippine Sea throughout the forecast period, far from the landmass. **It is forecast to exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on Monday evening or Tuesday early morning.**
- **"JULIAN" is forecast to intensify rapidly and may reach its peak intensity by Monday.**

Hazards affecting land and coastal waters:

- The raising of Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal is unlikely throughout the forecast period. Furthermore, "JULIAN" is less likely to directly cause high impact weather over the country.
- The Southwest Monsoon is forecast to bring moderate to rough seas (1.2 to 3.4 m) over the seaboard of Northern Luzon, the eastern seaboard of Central and Southern Luzon, **and the northern and eastern seaboard of Eastern Visayas.** Those with small seacrafts are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea.

Location of eye/center:	At 4:00 AM today, the eye of Typhoon "JULIAN" was located based on all available data at 740 km East of Casiguran, Aurora or 775 km East of Tuguegarao City, Cagayan (17.2 °N, 129.0 °E)
Strength:	Maximum sustained winds of 120 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 150 km/h.
Movement:	Almost Stationary
