SUBJECT Updated Coordinating Instructions for Disaster

Response Operations ICOW TY ODETTE

In connection with the ongoing response efforts for Typhoon ODETTE, this NDRRMC Memorandum is hereby issued to provide for the updated coordinating instructions for disaster response operations as provided for in all existence national policies, guidelines and standards.

Priority Areas and Needs

1. The following are considered as among the hardest hit areas and shall be prioritized for assistance, in addition to other affected localities:

Coordinating Instructions for National Response

- With reference to the instructions of the President, all NDRRMC member agencies, augmenting RDRRMCs and LGUs, together with civil society organizations and private sector, are enjoined to donate and prioritize provision of urgently needed items like shelter materials, food, and water, among others.
- Assisting agencies and organizations are enjoined to direct assistance and services to the recommended priority areas through proper coordination with the following:
 - a. Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) as the Vice Chairperson for Disaster Response and Early Recovery of the NDRRMC, with the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) as the Executive Arm and Secretariat

- The NDRRMC Logistics Cluster, led by the OCD, can facilitate air and sea mobility for supplies and personnel, subject to scheduling and prioritization. Assisting agencies, organizations and donors should arrange for bringing the said supplies and personnel to and from the air/seaports as determined by the OCD.
- 4. Agencies and organizations shall ensure self-sufficieny of teams and personnel; and be responsible for respective administrative and operational costs incurred for response.

Coordinating Instructions for International Assistance

- 1. Manifestations for international assistance and donations from foreign governments and International Organizations shall be coursed through the Philippine International Humanitarian Assistance Cluster (PIHAC) led by the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA). The decision to accept the donation or assistance shall, in general, be recommended by the NDRRMC or the beneficiary agency, subject to approval of the Office of the President (OP).
- 2. The DFA shall officially notify the assisting foreign government or International Organization regarding the approval of the OP for the acceptance of the international assistance.
- 3. Once a call for international assistance has been made, the DFA shall establish Philippine International Humanitarian Assistance Reception Centers (PIHARCs) strategically in selected ports to facilitate the entry of international resources.
- 4. For in-country teams and resources of foreign governments and International Organizations, coordination will be made with the NDRRMC through the OCD or the concerned beneficiary agency to recommend for mobilization, subject to approval of the OP. However, for in-country teams and resources of the United Nations and its related agencies, coordination will be made with the NDRRMC through the OCD or the concerned beneficiary agency upon the favorable endorsement of the Secretary, DFA, who will inform the OP of said in-country assistance.
- 5. The establishment and activation of coordinating centers for international assistance such as Multi-National Coordination Center (MNCC) and the United Nations On-Site Operations Coordination Centre (UN OSOCC) shall be properly coordinated with the NDRRMC, as necessary.

Management of Donations

- 1. For donations with intended beneficiaries, donors can directly proceed to deliver the donations using own logistics, administrative and operational arrangements.
- 2. For donations with no intended beneficiaries, the NDRRMC through the following agencies can receive the donations for dispatch to priority areas:

Reporting of Response Efforts

- 1. All agencies and organizations duly coordinated by the NDRRMC shall report results of operations and accomplishments to the corresponding Lead Agency of the Response Clusters. The Lead Agencies shall set specific reporting arrangements for this purpose.
- 2. The Lead Agencies shall submit Response Cluster Accomplishment Report to the DSWD and the OCD every 1800H to the following email addresses: dreamb@dswd.gov.ph and rocd@ocd.gov.ph.
- 3. For immediate reporting of accomplishments, the Lead Agencies of all Response Clusters shall further submit the following Essential Elements of Information (EEI) on a real-time basis, with action photos (if available):

Considerations for COVID-19

- 1. Only fully vaccinated personnel shall be allowed to be deployed in affected areas.
- 2. All resources, equipment and tools shall undergo disinfection prior to handover to intended user/beneficiary.
- 3. Establishment of field coordinating centers, command posts and other facilities shall strictly follow proper coordination with the Local, Regional and National Task Forces for COVID-19, as appropriate, and adhere to the minimum public health standards prescribed by the Department of Health (DOH).
- 4. Arriving international teams and personnel, along with their resources and equipment, shall generally follow the latest quarantine procedures in accordance with the country risk classification of origin countries/territories/jurisdictions pursuant to latest Inter-Agency Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF-EID) protocols.

However, international teams and personnel can perform respective assistance in the affected areas without undergoing quarantine, provided that they abide by the following conditions set by the DOH²:

- 1) Arriving passengers shall conduct RT-PCR testing 72 hours prior to departure;
- 2) All participants shall be fully vaccinated;
- 3) All paricipants shall be accommodated ib a semi-bubble set-up upon arrival with complete documentaiotn of all possibke contacts during the entire duration of visit:

- 4) Arriving passengers shall undergo testing oon the 5th day upon arrival following th eprotocols of IATF Resolution No. 154-C;
- 5) Arriving pasengers shall be closely monitore for signs and symptoms related to COVID-19 infection during the whole duration of their stay. If symptomatic, appripraite testing and isolation protocols shall apply; and
- 6) Minimum Public Health Standards, such as use of face mask and physical distancing, shall be adhere to at all times.

All members of DRRMCs at the National, Regional, Provincial, City, Municipal levels and Barangay Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Committees, Heads of National Government Agencies, Constitutional Offices, State Universities and Colleges, Government Owned and/or Controlled corporations, and Private Stakeholders are hereby enjoined to adhere to the above instructions to ensure well-coordinated and harmonized response for Typhoon ODETTE.
